Wife's Dream About Mate Prompts Search For Plane

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore. (AP) — A wife's dream about her husband, co-pilot of a missing air force C-47 plane, brought her here Saturday to join in the search for the missing craft.

Mrs. Vernon Moe, of Vallejo, Calif., said that two nights ago she dreamed of talking to her husband and that he told her he had landed the plane at a place called "Day."

Out of curiosity, she said, she checked a CAA map and discovered a place called Day, Calif., 70 miles south of here in the general vicinity of which the plane disappeared last Dec. 28.

Mrs. Moe, a petite brunette and mother of two children, and her brother, Bert Whistler, came here, and a plane from the Klamath Falls air rescue unit was to fly her over the tiny timber community Saturday.

Search for the plane, which vanished on a flight from Spokane to Travis Air Base, Calif., with three crew members and five aerial hitchhikers aboard, was resumed Friday.

A fier hunting another plane reported last Sunday he had spotted the wreckage of a C-47 on snow-covered Ash Creek Butte, 12 miles east of Mt. Shasta. Nothing was found in a search next day.

Cover Area On Foot
Friday Ed Scholer and George Wardell, members of the Klamath Falls Air Rescue Unit, landed a small ski-equipped plane on a narrow ridge about 6,800 feet up on the Butte. They covered the area on foot, but found nothing.

Queen Expecting No. 3, Hint Of London Papers

LONDON — Two London newspapers have hinted that Queen Elizabeth II may be expecting her third child.

By suggesting on inside pages that a royal birth may be the reason for putting off the coronation until next summer, the Sunday Pictorial and Sunday Express went about as far as they could without shattering customary discretion in such matters. No one was so blunt as to say the Queen was pregnant.

Buckingham Palace maintained its usual dignified silence on the rumors. Past palace announcements did not come until four months before Elizabeth's babies were expected.

Ash Creek Butte is about 30 air-line miles southeast of Day, where the search for Mrs. Moe was to be made.

Mrs. Moe said her husband, a captain, had been reluctant to fly the missing plane.

"I'll see you again provided that old bucket of bolts holds together," were his last words when he left home to make the flight, she said.

tion, the youth said his father drank to excess and "pushed me and my mother around a lot." His father beat him a lot, the boy said, and a couple of times hit him with a heavy poker.

The boy has been in Woodburn for the last 10 months, and hopes to get out on parole soon. He felt that the school "helped a little bit" and added that an official of the training school said there was a big change in his attitude. In fact, the youth said, he'd like to get a job there after he's paroled.

He has some definite plans in mind for the school and would like to take over a 4-H program there.

The school doesn't have enough to do for the youngsters, he said. But it has almost unlimited acreage and he'd like to see a program where they could get in the field and raise crops and take care of livestock.

Enthusiastically describing the program he has in mind, the youth commented, "I'm going to ask them (the school officials) if they'll let me do it for nothing until I can get it started and get out on parole."

He has "studied up quite a bit on agriculture and would like to study the subject more. Asked if he would be willing to study subjects he didn't like—such as spelling and arithmetic—to be able to delve into agriculture further, the youth replied:

"I would try—if someone would help me. I don't think I can do it all by myself."

Robbed Millionaire Has Advice For Thieves

RENO — Millionaire L. V. Redfield said Monday the burglars who carried off his safe with \$2,500,000 got currency "so hot they might as well light their cigarettes with it."

Most of the \$300,000 in the safe was in big, old fashioned bills, including two \$10,000 notes.

The eccentric millionaire said they would be almost impossible to cash; and so would \$2,000,000 in negotiable securities. The balance was in distinctive jewelry.
