

1-Picture Firm's Legality Upheld By U.S. Judge

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Legality of "one-picture" corporations was upheld in federal court Thursday in a decision which affects millions of dollars in motion picture income.

Presiding U.S. District Judge Leon R. Yankwich, ordering the government to refund nearly 200 thousand dollars to screen writer F. Hugh Herbert, criticized legislators and government officials for "constant talk of tax loopholes."

In his decision, he also said: "The Supreme Court of the United States, since 1874, has insisted that a taxpayer may, legally and honorably, take means to minimize his tax."

Herbert and his wife, Mary, had sued the government for return of \$34,945 assessed on 1945-46 income and \$163,590 on 1946-47 income.

Herbert contended his income was subject to the 25 per cent capital gains tax, instead of regular income tax, which in cases of some high-bracketed film folk might run three times the capital gains figure.

Depositor Doesn't Err In Trusting Stranger

TACOMA (AP) — Harold Luvaas, Tacoma insurance man, believes he must really have an honest face.

Walking down the street in Seattle Thursday he was hailed by a passing motorist who asked him to do him a favor.

"Sure," Luvaas said. The man in the automobile said he couldn't find a parking space and handed Luvaas \$200 in cash and a business card.

"Deposit that in the bank for me, will you?"

The dazed Luvaas rushed into the bank and deposited the money while the trusting man circled the block and picked up his deposit slip from Luvaas waiting at the curb.

COPCO LINEMAN KILLED
LAKEVIEW, Ore. (AP) — Arthur Marion Wiedeman, 38, was killed Friday when he contacted a 12,000-volt power line at the American Forest Production Corp. sawmill here.

Wiedeman, a lineman for the California Oregon Power Company for the past five years, apparently touched the line with his head while working on another line. The widow and three children survive.

Pearson Denies Deficit Threat

PORTLAND (AP) — The Democratic party in Oregon is having trouble finding candidates for state offices, a party official said here Thursday night.

William H. Way, party chairman for Multnomah County, said there were no sure candidates for attorney general, secretary of state or state treasurer.

Walter Pearson, state treasurer now who will run for the legislature this year, told the meeting of county Democrats that Republicans are planning to put over a sales tax.

He said the Republicans were talking about a sure deficit in the state treasury. The fact is, Pearson said, there will be at least 10 million dollars in surplus at the end of the present biennium.

He said some more industries in Oregon, plus closure of tax loopholes for corporations and co-operatives, would eliminate any need for new taxes.

Truman, Ewing Oppose Socialized Medicine

WASHINGTON (AP) — Oscar R. Ewing, head of the Federal Security Agency, told Congress Friday both he and President Truman are "unequivocally" opposed to socialized medicine.

Ewing made the statement in testifying before a House expenditures subcommittee which is studying a bill to create a new Department of Health.

The FSA director said he is against setting up a health department. Instead, he suggested elevating the FSA, which he heads, to Cabinet rank.

Army To Drop Guards' Anti-Aircraft Units

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army said Thursday it will begin releasing anti-aircraft units of the National Guard in June. All such units will be back under state control by May, 1953.

As each anti-aircraft artillery brigade, group or operations detachment of the National Guard is released, a new unit will be activated by the Army to take its place. All these groups are sub-units of divisions. The ruling applies to units both in this country and overseas.

Challenge Of God To Christians Cited

BUFFALO, N. Y. (AP) — A three-point challenge faces all Christians in everyday business and social life, according to a formal report issued by 325 delegates to the North American Lay Conference on THE Christian and his daily work.

As outlined in the statement at Sunday's closing session, God requires: "1. That we work in partnership with Him and in accordance with His laws.

"2. That we work unselfishly for the good of our fellow man.

"3. That as members of the church, we search our minds and hearts as we seek to live up to the highest standards which Christ taught us."

Laymen from 34 Protestant church groups in the United States and Canada adopted the brief, 500-word statement after an hour's debate.

TAX DODGER FREED
LEWISBURG, Pa. (AP) — Bennett E. Meyers, former Air Force general, was released from the federal penitentiary here Thursday after serving a term for income tax evasion. He had been sentenced to serve a year and a day, plus 30 days for failure to pay a \$15,000 fine.

**Canadian Stock Ban
Also Hits Hay, Straw**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Agriculture Department officials said Tuesday an order banning livestock shipments from Canada, because of an outbreak of foot and mouth disease, also applies to hay and straw.

An official told a reporter these products are involved:

Prohibited: Cows, sheep, goats and hogs and any fresh, chilled or frozen beef, veal, mutton, lamb and pork.

Restricted: Hay and straw and animal by-products, such as hides, skins and bone meal. In effect, the official said, there is little difference between a flat prohibition and a restriction.

Small Town Advised How To Hold Doctor

DENVER (AP) — A doctor who gave up practice in Detroit to serve the people of a South Dakota town of 800 population gave a few simple rules Friday which he said would help a small town get and hold a doctor.

Dr. Kennet Kaish of Phillip, S. D., spoke at the Seventh National Conference on Rural Health. He said a small town should:

To obtain a doctor, provide adequate hospital facilities and personnel, office space for a doctor to rent and the type of town in which a person would want to live; To keep a doctor, treat him as human being with the same mental outlook and physical stamina as yourselves, try working with him instead of against him.
