The Melrose Extension Unit will not meet Friday as previously planned. They have postponed the meeting indefinitely.

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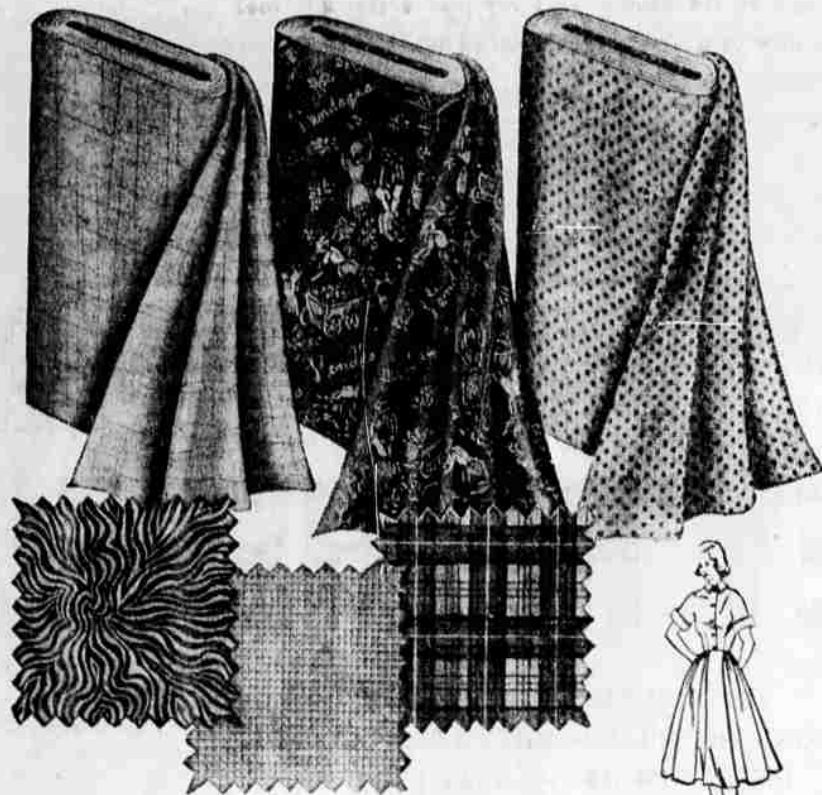
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
