

Pirates Down Reedsport, 87 to 53

Braves Early Lead Tumbles In Onslaught

Douglas Champs Have Opportunity For Tie In Contest Tonight

Like lambs to the slaughter, the Reedsport Braves herded into Coos Bay Friday night for the District 5 championship basketball playoff opener. The Marshfield prep Pirates wielded the knife, 87-53.

This gives the Pirates the first leg on the state tournament berth, and they try for the all-important second tonight on the Reedsport court. If the Coos County champs can cop the one tonight, it's all over. If not, the series will go into another game on the Marshfield court next Tuesday.

At the outset of the game, it appeared the Braves were going to give the state's fourth-rated Pirates a run for their money. After Marshfield jumped to a 3-0 initial lead, Bill Earls put his Reedsport squad back in the game with three foul shots. The lead surged back to Marshfield, 7-4, on baskets by Fred Krouh, the former Sutherlin star, and Stan Lewis. But the Braves boomed back with seven straight points on two baskets and a free throw by Duane Leggett, and another basket by Earls. That put the Douglas County prepsters ahead, 11-7.

Pirates Turn Tables
Then, taking its turn, the Pirates poured in 12 straight, led by the blistering scoring pace of Guard Spike Hillstrom. By the end of the first frame, the hosts were on their way, 23-16. By halftime, the lead had been increased to 16 points and, going into the last quarter, the western champs were on top, 67-42. The lead ballooned to 34 points by game's end.

Hillstrom was the hottest firing arm on a generally torrid Pirate quintet. He shoved in 18 tallies in the first half and added four in the final half for the game's high performance of 22 points. Lloyd Hoffine scored 13 to tie Reedsport's high scorers, Dick Kylo and Berge Borrevik. Marshfield's Krouh rang up 10.

It was a rough and tumble affair that saw 59 fouls committed. Marshfield picked up 33, and Reedsport committed 26. For Marshfield, four of the first five fouled out and two of Reedsport's starters hit the showers early. For Marshfield, they were Krouh, Hillstrom, Stan Lewis and Don Bick. Reedsport lost Duane Leggett and Henry Husko.

Boxing Faces 'Trust' Complaint

NEW YORK (AP) — Professional sports faced an attack on another front Saturday following a federal grand jury recommendation that the government take anti-trust action to end "restraint of trade and broadcasting of championship fights."

Thus boxing became the third major sport to be threatened with an anti-trust suit since the last world war. The others are pro football and baseball.

The action against boxing was made in a presentation to Federal Judge William Bondy by the grand jury, which has been probing the sport since last October.

No specific organization or person was mentioned in the presentation. And Melville C. Williams, head of the anti-trust division in the office of U. S. Attorney Myles J. Lane, declined to say whether the exclusive-service contracts of the International Boxing Club with champions were involved.

Milwaukie Fifth Team To Clinch Tourney Place

Milwaukie became the fifth team to clinch a spot in Oregon Class A High School Basketball Tournament in Eugene March 18-22 by dropping Oregon City, 44-39, Friday night.

The favorites came through in all other district play-offs except two, and at least two other tournament berths will be won Saturday night.

Jerry Zimmerman, a talented center, registered 13 points to lead Milwaukie to the District 12 championship. Milwaukie will meet the District 1 titlist in the opening round of the tourney.

Albany and Corvallis entered the District 7 final, to be played Saturday night. Albany, which will be the favorite, defeated Newport, 52-43, while Corvallis swamped Toledo, 65-33.

McMinnville, rated No. 5 in the final Associated Press weekly prep poll, handed Dayton its first defeat of the season in high school competition, 66-54. McMinnville, which has won 20 of its 24 games, will play for the District 7 title with Taft, which beat Willamina, 41-37.

Pendleton, Klamath Falls, Astoria and Marshfield are favored to win their way into the tournament Saturday.

Huskies Lose Opener Game To Bruin Team

UCLA Looks Good In Winning; Washington Has Chance Tonight

LOS ANGELES (AP) — UCLA's Surprising Bruins were one up with one to go Saturday for the Pacific Coast Conference basketball title.

Coach Johnny Wooden's boys soundly trounced the powerful University of Washington Huskies Friday night, 65-63. If they can do it again they're in.

They outclassed the Northern Division champions in the opener. They excelled in speed, in play-making and in shooting. Washington excelled only in height. The Huskies towered over the smaller but faster Bruins.

UCLA stopped Frank Guiness, the Washington all-around star, and in doing that took much of the zip from the Huskies' attack. Guiness was able to score only nine points. Washington's center, Bob Houbregs, high scorer in the Northern Division, corralled 18 points, and Guard Mike McCutchen contributed 12.

The Bruins' brilliant freshman forward, Don Bragg, not only was high man for the game, but it was his guarding of Guiness that threw the monkeywrench into the invaders' attack. Bragg scored 19 points and his fellow forward, Jerry Norman, got 14.

The surprise performance of the night, however, was by the little Bruin guard, Ron Livingston, the best dribbler on the floor. He collected a pass or two intercepted, ball stolen or a pass intercepted.

UCLA jumped into an early lead, Washington came fast to tie the score at 19-19 just before the first quarter ended, and four quick Washington baskets just before the half ended gave the Huskies a 35-34 margin.

UCLA scored 19 points to Washington's nine in the third period, then went into a freeze in the last period to protect its lead.

Elkton, Powers In Finals Of District 4-B Teams In Tonight's Play At Coquille

Elkton and Powers took final berths in the District 4-B basketball finals at Coquille Friday night.

The Elks bounced the Curry County champion Brookings Bruins, 50-32, and Powers edged Drain, the Douglas County titleholder, 44-40. The Elks and Cruisers meet for the district crown tonight at 8:30, following the consolation opener between Drain and Brookings at 7.

Drain's Warriors came close to posting the major upset of the tourney by upsetting the defending district champs. If it hadn't been for Duane Brady and a phenomenal free-throw shooting average, the Warriors would have turned the trick.

Brady took top scoring honors with 18 points, and the Cruisers combined to score just that many in 23 trips to the foul line. Brady himself got half his total from the gift circle. His nine gratis tallies

came in nine attempts. From the field, the Warriors scored 15 field goals to Powers' 13.

The score was tied at 7-all in the first quarter and was knotted four other times in the half, while the lead changed hands three times in the first half. Powers' tight two-three defense started telling in the second half, and the Cruisers posted their biggest lead of 39-30 with just six minutes left in the game.

The Cruisers went into a stall in the last four minutes, but Frank Walton and Jack Weaver got the ball enough times to help slice that lead to the final four points. Weaver scored 13 for Drain.

Elkton had little trouble with the Bruins of Curry County. The Elks completely dominated the backboards and took advantage of Brookings scoring difficulties to build up quarter leads of 12-4, 26-17 and 34-20. Elkton found free throwing figuring well in its scoring column, also. The Elks kept an easy lead in the first half by capitalizing on nine of 14 free throws. They didn't need them in the second half after Brookings went through the entire third quarter with only a basket and a free throw.

Bruin Jim Fitzhugh scored 15 points for the losers to lead the individual performances. Elkton's Ronnie Henderson, Carl Hezberger and Frank Gill score 11 each.
