## Requirements For Air Force Cadets Relaxed

HAMILTON, CALIF., Mar.—To offset a critical shortage of Air Force cadet applicants, the Air Force is reducing the minimum requirements for cadets and is stepping up its program for obtaining cadets for pilot or aircraft observer training.

In announcing the change, Major General William E. Hall, commanding general of the Fourth Air Force with headquarters at Hamilton Air Force Base, states, "The U. S. Air Force needs 1,200 new cadets by April 1, and 1,200 per month thereafter."

Minimum age for cadet applicants has been reduced from 20 to 19 years.

In the case of airmen now in the Air Force, a high school diploma will be sufficient.

The appeal for cadets is being made to Air Force enlisted men, college students (whether or not they are currently enrolled in Air Force R.O.T.C.) and young men who have withdrawn from college because of financial hardship.

## Tax Exemption Deadline Cited To Vets, Widows

Disabled veterans and war widows are warned that April 1 is the last day on which they may apply for a \$1500 property tax exemption provided by state law. Application is made to the county assessor in the county where the property is located.

The Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs said the special tax exemption on homes or personal property is available to the following persons:

1. Any war veteran with a 40 percent disability or more, as certified by the Veterans Administration or a branch of the armed forces. The veteran must obtain this statement from the Portland VA regional office, or from the branch of service from which he was retired, and submit it to the county assessor when he applies for the tax exemption.
2. The unmarried widow of a war veteran. She must submit proof of the husband's military service and copies of the marriage and death certificates.
3. Any union veteran of the Mexican, Civil or Indian wars.
4. Any war veteran who, lacking a disability rating from the VA or the armed forces, submits a certified statement from his physician and the county health officer that he is 40 percent disabled. The veteran in this category is not entitled to the exemption if his gross income in the last calendar year exceeded \$2500.

Men who have served in the armed forces for 90 days or more since June 25, 1950, are now classified as war veterans and they or their widows may receive the exemption if they otherwise qualify.

Widows of Spanish-American war veterans receive another \$500 exemption in addition to the \$1500, for a \$2000 total exemption.

## Qualifications For Coast Guard Entry Set Forth

Two Coast Guard representatives paid an official visit to Roseburg Thursday to announce the present enlistment standards of the United States Coast Guard. The recruiters — Ed Swenson, Chief Quartermaster, and Dick Daoust, Seaman—working out of their Portland office, are visiting all the principal cities of Oregon to promote more interest in their branch of the armed forces.

Basically, the qualifications for enlistment in the U. S. Coast Guard are as follows: Men without previous service must be between the ages of 17 and 22 and may have one dependent (wife). Enlistments in certain petty officer ratings are now being offered to qualified servicemen having not more than three dependents.

All applicants must pass a rigid physical and mental examination, and be of high moral character.

Upon acceptance, applicants are enlisted for a period of four years and transferred to Alameda, Calif. for basic training.
