SPOT ADVICE SILK

The main thing to remember about silk is that, like wool, it is an organic material. It can be attacked by moths. And it is extremely elastic and thus subject to stretching, particularly during the finishing operation.

So — while it is a beautiful and desirable material — it must be handled with the care so rich and expensive a material deserves.

When you're buying silk, be sure to find out whether the garment or yardage is raw silk, pure dye silk, sized or unsized, and whether it's "weighted".

Weighted silks have a tendency to deteriorate faster than those which are not. They're the poorest of silk buys, and the extra body and sleekness imparted to them by the weighting process is merely compensation for inferior quality. THEY DO NOT STAND UP WELL UNDER CLEANING.

Sizing is not necessarily an evil in silks, if the fabric is of good quality to begin with and the sizing process is properly executed.

Cleaning undamaged silk of good quality represents no special problem. However, in finishing, care must be exercised to make certain that stretching, water marks and burning are avoided.
