

Milwaukie, Pendleton Move Into Top Ten Prep Listing

Two late-rising teams climbed into the top 10 in the weekly Associated Press poll on high school basketball teams. Just one week before the final poll of the season and before the state tournament starts, Milwaukie and Pendleton moved up among the leaders.

Still dominating the poll of sportswriters and sportscasters

were the same three Portland teams that have led from the season's start — Central Catholic, Cleveland and Lincoln.

Gets Nine Votes
Central Catholic again is No. 1, getting nine votes for first place. Cleveland moved up a notch after defeating Lincoln in a playoff game, 33-36.

Cleveland got two votes for first place, and wound up as No. 2. Lincoln got one first-place vote and enough other points to become the No. 3 team.

Once more Marshfield was rated as the best of the upstate hopefuls, getting the No. 4 position, followed by McMinnville, La Grande and Klamath Falls.

Next came the newcomer Milwaukie which jumped into the poll after earning a state tournament berth by defeating Oregon City 44-39. Oregon City ranked No. 9 in last week's poll.

Behind Milwaukie came Salem No. 9 this time in place of its No. 7 rating a week ago. Pendleton became the No. 10 team although earning only 11 points in the voting.

Headed For Tournament
All these teams appear headed for the state tournament. Cleveland, Lincoln, Marshfield, McMinnville, Klamath Falls and Milwaukie already are assured entry.

Central Catholic, Salem, La Grande and Pendleton are favored to win berths this week. The poll with season record listed for each team:

Dizzy Dean Gets Hit For Political Views

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — Patrolman J. A. Barrera said Charles K. Clark of Lakeland, in municipal court here Monday on charges of drunkenness and assault, got in a fight with Dizzy Dean in an argument over whether the Democrats would nominate Georgia's Sen. Russell or Harry Truman for President.

Clark said he and Dean, former baseball great, were discussing politics with two others in a night club and that the debate narrowed down to the Democratic choice for President.

Patrolman Barrera said Clark struck Dean "and they were off." Judge Robert Johnson dismissed the assault charge against Clark and suspended a 30-day sentence on the drunkenness charge.

Dean, who supported Truman, was not charged with anything.

Detroit Bowling Team Breaks Tie, Wins Title

DETROIT (AP) — Detroit's E&B world match game bowling champions knocked down the challenging King Louis team from Chicago Monday night with a 4,180-3,905 victory in a four-game roll-off.

The roll-off, first in the 18-year history of the match game title event, came after the two teams ended their 24-game challenge round in a 24,193-24,193 tie.

E&B, holder of the world match game crown since 1949, won two of four games by decisive margins in the roll-off for the 275-pin triumph.

Recluse Ragpicker Leaves \$25,000 Estate

TORONTO (AP) — Alvin Poser was a dirty, ragged, ragpicker who lived alone in squalor. He used to bring money into a trust company for deposit and some of the employees there tried to avoid waiting on him.

So he kept coming to George Ernest Buchanan, an executive of the company, who believed in "treating every customer as best I know how."

The old ragpicker, aged 70, died 11 days ago. He left \$25,000—\$15,000 of it to Buchanan, the will disclosed Wednesday.

Buchanan said Poser came to the trust company in 1918 with \$5,000. Aided by Buchanan's investment advice, it grew to \$25,000.

The banker said he hadn't seen the old man for four years.

"The shape of his hands told me he must have been a cultured man," Buchanan said.

"They were the hands of an artist, once he washed them."

Building Controls Eased On Commercial Housing

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government eased building controls Thursday on housing, commercial, highway and school projects.

The National Production Authority, dropping an earlier plan to limit the size of dwellings and restrict new homes to 1 1/2 bathrooms each, issued:

1. A new, one-package housing order increasing by 500 pounds the steel which a home-builder may use without applying to NPA.

2. An order combining all other construction controls into a single document. It increases the tonnage of steel automatically allowed for commercial, school, and other smaller non-residential projects, as well as roads and highways.
