House Group Cuts Employees' Extra Salary Request

WASHINGTON (AP) — A 9 per cent cut in the \$1,068,542.825 President Truman asked in extra funds for more than a score of federal agencies was recommended by the House Appropriations Committee Friday.

The committee sent to the House floor for debate next week a bill approving \$970,192,943 of the amount sought.

The money was requested to supplement previous appropriations made to the agencies for the present fiscal year, ending next June 30.

More than a third of the new money is to foot the bill for pay raises voted by Congress last year for federal employees.

Another large chunk, \$285,900,000, is for veterans' benefits, including education and training and life insurance.

The money trimmed from the President's requests reflected a cut in funds for every agency except the House of Representatives itself. The \$114,395 budgeted for additional House expenses was hiked to \$130,895.

The committee approved an increase of 60 1/2 million dollars in funds for reimbursement to states under the federal-aid highway system.

This boosts to \$18 million dollars the federal money available for the road program this fiscal year.

Plaintiff Gets Verdict Over Deal In Timber

A Circuit Court jury Tuesday awarded Mr. and Mrs. Howard P. Bobb \$1,105 in a suit against E. D. Heath of Myrtle Creek.

The Bobbs also of Myrtle Creek, contended in the suit they had been deceived into selling \$12,000 worth of timber for \$750. They sued to recover the remaining \$11,250.

The jury deliberated a lengthy six hours before returning the verdict. It was the last trial of the first 1952 Circuit Court term.

The defense contended the transaction was a legitimate profit under the free enterprise system.

Newbold Morris On Senate Grill In Ship Deals

WASHINGTON (AP) — Newbold Morris, government cleanup man, heatedly told investigating senators Tuesday there was no "wrongdoing" in his connection with ship deals which wound up with former U.S. government tankers hauling oil to Red China.

And he denounced a law under which a group of prominent persons reaped 3 1/2 million dollars profit—some \$450,000 of it coming from Morris' clients—on \$101,000 cash they invested in tankers purchased from the government.

"You bet your life, Mr. Flanagan," he told Subcommittee Counsel Francis D. Flanagan who asked if he thought the law was a bad one.

"And when I get through down here you'll have a bill to correct it."

Morris made clear he has no intention of resigning the government cleanup job. He has been under fire in Congress—mostly from fellow Republicans—since President Truman placed him in it on Feb. 1.

In weeks of hearings, the Senate Investigations subcommittee has developed that a group of prominent persons, headed by ex-Rep. Joseph E. Casey, made 3 1/2 million dollars from an investment of \$101,000 in surplus ships.

Morris was not among this group but his name has come repeatedly into the hearings.

Two ships the Casey group bought were turned over to United Tanker Corp., a shipping concern which employed Morris' law firm as counsel.

Tankers owned by this company, it developed, hauled oil to the Chinese Reds until about a month before the outbreak of the Korean War.
