### Needs Of Police Dept. Assured Consideration

The police committee of the Roseburg City Council will be glad to give consideration to any equipment needs of the police department, reports Councilman Frank Ashley, committee chairman. "The police department has made no complaints to the committee concerning lack of equipment," Ashley declared. He was commenting upon reports in The News-Review from department members regarding needs. The committee chairman recommended a meeting between department heads and committee members.

"If we find that the complaints are justified, we will be glad to suggest proper appropriations to the budget committee," Ashley said. "Any funds for equipment purposes must be included in the annual city budget."

He called attention to the fact that he and his fellow committee members in late years had succeeded in sponsoring much new equipment for the police department, including the city-owned central radio station and two-way installations in police cars.

returns, due Saturday, and (2) the mailing of 30 million tax refund checks, now in progress. (While midnight March 15, is the statutory deadline for income tax returns, taxpayers will have until midnight Monday because Saturday is not a business day for the federal government.)

### 64 "Plums" Abolished

The reorganization plan abolishes the jobs of the present 64 politically appointed collectors of internal revenue across the country. It establishes instead a system of 21 district commissioners, and 64 deputy district commissioners where collectors' offices are now located.

All these officials and other top-level officials at Washington headquarters—except for the Revenue Commissioner—will be placed under civil service.

Asked if the present collectors were resigning en masse, Dunlap said "Congress took care of their resignations yesterday."

WASHINGTON (AP)—Washington and Oregon senators split evenly in Thursday's vote on the proposal to reject President Truman's internal revenue revision plan.

Sens. Cain R.-Wash., and Cordell R.-Ore., voted to reject it; Morse R.-Ore., and Magnuson D.-Wash., voted against rejection.

### Rotarians Shown Wildlife Picture

If duck and goose hunting is to remain a sport for thousands of the nation's hunters, conservation measures must be enacted and enforced. That was the theme of a film, "Behind the Flyways," shown Rotarians during a noon luncheon in the Civic Room of the Umpqua Hotel Thursday.

The United States Fish and Wildlife Service is conducting elaborate surveys to determine proper water-fowl conservation policies. To acquire knowledge for scientific management of waterfowl, thousands of persons are engaged in continuous observation.

Through the information gleaned from these surveys, it has been possible to determine the flyways used by migrating birds.

Along these routes refuges have been laid out and feed is provided. Hunters are also restricted to these areas.

An effort is also made to determine the number of birds that will be hatched each year by visiting the breeding areas.

When this data has been obtained, it is sent to Service headquarters in Washington and tentative conservation policy is proposed. These proposals are sent to state game commissions, where recommendations are made.

After states have sent their proposals to headquarters, the Service drafts and the regulation sends them to govern waterfowl hunting during the coming year.

They are planning to enter the spring flower show in April. At their meeting this week they made lapel pins and painted them.

erty to iron out inequalities and to bring the tax rolls up to date. "We are all aware," he said, "of the fact that there has always been some inequalities resulting from inefficient or inadequate assessment procedures. These inequalities became insufferable during the period following the war."

The Assessment and Taxation Division of the State Tax Commission has received more than double its former legislative appropriation to assist in a program of reassessment and equalization throughout the state, the commissioner said.

In a discussion of traffic safety, Bowes said the Governor's Annual Safety Conference last November recommended two legislative proposals. It was suggested that state arrest laws be amended to permit officers to make ris-demeanor arrests on information or on belief in traffic accident investigation. Another suggestion was that all agencies adopt a uniform traffic citation and that enabling legislation be passed to permit serving of warrants, based on complaints, throughout the state.

comfortably close to four American warships. Even the air war was washed out by storm clouds, blown down from Manchuria.

Pilots from the Carriers Valley Forge and Antietam reported they cut Communist rail lines in 127 places Thursday and destroyed 87 small craft. Marine pilots battered the wobbly Red railroad system with another 26 cuts, attacked troops, bunkers and gun positions.

MUNSAN (AP)—Prisoner exchange talks neared a dead end Friday and U.N. truce negotiators suggested turning the whole problem back to staff officers.

Rear Adm. R. E. Libby said the negotiations are at a virtual standstill and "progress will be at best extremely slow."

The Communists promised to think it over. They may reply Saturday.
