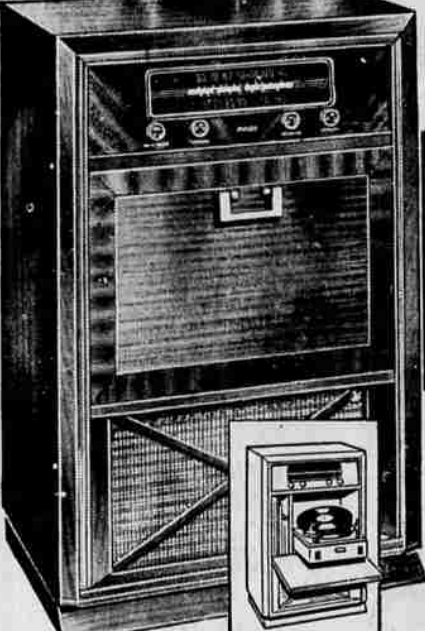

PITTSBURGH — Juvenile Oberman, 54, of Pittsburgh took a 10-day jail term rather than pay a \$5 fine for drunkenness, but police still don't know why—Oberman was really heavy with money.

Two policemen who searched Oberman as he was admitted to jail will vouch his money was heavy.

Included in a total of \$1,100 on his person was 34 pounds of silver coins. Police weighed them.

Shortly after the prisoner was admitted Monday he was transferred to the jail dispensary for treatment of a leg ailment of which he complained. The service is free for inmates.

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Congress Plans To Cut Request For Foreign Aid

WASHINGTON — President Truman's one-two "Sunday punch" for his \$7,900,000,000 foreign aid program left Congress members still talking about scaling it down Friday, almost as if nothing had happened.

Even administration supporters conceded they were in for a rough time.

The President left off with a 7,500 word special message to Congress Thursday declaring every single dollar of the amount he asked for was needed to meet the threat of Russian Communism.

Then he went on a far-ranging network of radio and television Thursday night to carry his plea direct to the American people.

Although the President said "we would be better off to win the fight against Communism than to win any particular election," some senators and representatives said privately he appeared to be injecting politics into the matter after asking them to avoid doing so.

Every Dollar Said Needed

Alluding to Congressional threats to slash foreign aid by billions, Truman told his radio-TV audience:

"Now I know this is a very popular point of view, especially in an election year—just as popular as a campaign pledge to reduce taxes."

But he said the \$7,900,000,000 request was not "a single dollar more than our national security requires."

Sen. Hickenlooper (R-Ia.) told this reporter what the President "really means is they won't spend a dollar more than the Democratic administration requires to stay in power."

"We failed to stop Communism in Korea and it's become more clear every day that European unity is not materializing," Hickenlooper said. "Meanwhile the evidence of waste and corruption in public funds and contracts is growing."

Chairman Connally (D-Tex.), of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, was happy Truman asked

less than last year, when he requested 8 1/4 billion, but added: "I am confident that even this lower figure can be cut."

IRISH ECONOMY CRITICAL
DUBLIN, Ireland — Finance Minister Sean MacCenteen warned the Irish economy is in a highly critical state and said he would impose sharp import cuts in his budget April 2.
