

CBA, Oaks Win Tournament Tilts

Coos River,
Coburg Fall
Before Locals

Oakland smashed through the first round of the Ashland Invitational a Southern Oregon College Thursday, and Canyonville Bible Academy chipped out a win.

The Oaks, led by Bud Powell, slaughtered Coos River, 86-28, and the CBA Pilots just squeezed out a 43-41 victory over tough Coburg.

Coach Stephen Beck's Oaks just wouldn't be stopped in running up the biggest score in the early stages of the tourney. Powell rang up 22 points to lead the tallymakers, Lyle Becroft had 14 and Freshman Dale Marshall poured in a surprising 18 points to swamp the Coos County squad.

Has Trouble

Canyonville Bible Academy had plenty of trouble with the Lane County runner-up Coburg squad before finally eking out the two-point win. Willie Mannwarren scored 17 points to pace the game. The Pilots led at halftime, 24-19.

By a freak pairing arrangement, the Coburg Broncos were eliminated by the loss. One team had to go because 17 teams were participating. All other losers, however, go into the consolation bracket. The Pilots now meet Elkton in another first round game.

Other first round wins in the tourney were: Lorane over Butte Falls, 37-35; Talent over McKenzie, 40-25; Valsezt over Prospect, 83-29 and Mohawk over Paisley, 43-27.

The tap dancing master of the 160 pound division had to travel at top speed to score a 15 round unanimous decision over his younger rival.

He next defends against Rocky Graziano in Chicago April 16 and against Paddy Young in New York May 16 "If I still have the title."

Robinson, obviously tired after exchanging punches with the rugged 23-year old Honolulu-born fighter, said he finished in good condition. He agreed his layoff since he regained his title from Randy Turpin of England last September had slowed him.

Pilots Whip And Humiliate Hamline Five

KANSAS CITY (AP) — There'll be a new champion in the 14th National Intercollegiate Basketball Tournament for sure and the winner will have beaten the best field ever assembled for the six-day small college meet.

The Portland (Ore.) University Pilots took care of the new champion angle by outscoring, then humiliating three time Champion Hamline University of St. Paul, Minn., 75-67 in the quarterfinals to the delight of 8,000 fans Thursday night.

The Pilots, who came to the tournament with a 21-9 record, will meet Murray (Ky.) State (23-9) in the semifinal feature Friday night. Murray State dumped Whitworth College of Spokane 81-69, but failed to stop the losers' tall Ralph Polson who poured in 41 points.

Southwest Texas State, a 65-57 winner over Lawrence Tech, and Springfield, Mo., which eliminated Morningside (Ia.), 87-74 will meet in the other semifinal.

Put On Exhibit

Portland put on a typical Harlem Globe Trotter exhibition in the last five minutes after it had the game won from a badly flustered Hamline team.

The fans roared as Andy Anderson, 6 foot 4 inch Negro star, performed all of the Goose Tatum tricks and Million Harvest McGillvery and Jim Winters entered into the clowning.

A different reaction from that of the fans came from Joe Hutton, coach of 1951 Champion Hamline.

Hutton commented: "It was a new experience for me in intercollegiate sports. I felt that it was completely uncalculated. It's the first time I've ever seen it done outside of the professional Harlem Globe Trotters.

"Portland played a great game and our kids played poorly. I could see no reason for them (Portland) humiliating a beaten team. Had

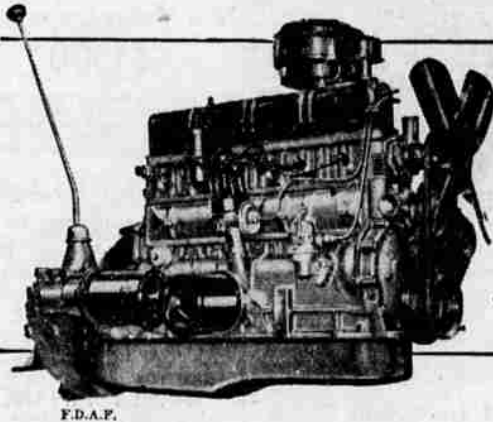

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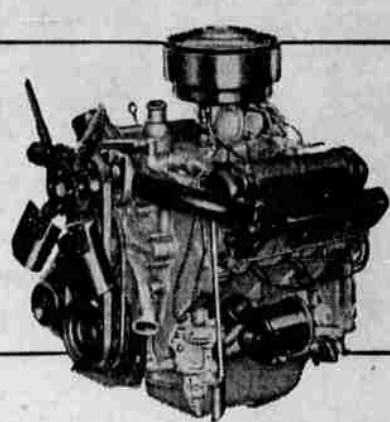
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
