High blood pressure is on the increase. It is estimated that approximately 18 per cent of the U. S. population will suffer fatally from it or its effects. It is causing nearly as many deaths as any other disease.

Modern life with its fast living and high tension creating a state of chronic anxiety states, lasting for months, may result in permanent hypertension. Primitive races seem to be free of it.

Chronic hypertension affects the heart, brain and kidneys. It may cause heart failure and increased hardening of the arteries. Increased fragility of the blood vessels and consequent breaking may cause paralysis or death. Interference with arteries nourishing the kidneys results in hypertension, caused primarily by a disturbance of their nerve supply. The more the kidneys become affected, the higher the pressure rises.

Shortness of breath on exertion, palpitation, dizziness, headaches, spots before the eyes, poor memory, irritability, cold extremities and numbness are the most prominent symptoms. Poor circulation and pains are caused by a decrease in size of the blood vessels and loss of elasticity of their walls. More women suffer from high blood pressure than men, however it seems to be less fatal to the female sex.

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Survey Of Winchester Bay Assured By Board's Action

An engineers survey of Winchester Bay was assured Friday when the County Parks Board voted to pay for half the costs.

The Port of Umpqua commission has already indicated it would bear the other half.

The survey will be used in long-range plans for improvements of the area and to establish the costs necessary for improvements.

Charles S. Collins, parks supervisor, said the survey will bring information of a previous Army Engineers' survey up to date.

Channels and depths in the area have changed, largely due to a training jetty built by the Engineers in 1950. The jetty, Collins said, has brought about changes in currents, leading to new channels and newly - formed deltas.

Based on the survey, plans for constructions of a seawall and dredging of the bay will be formed. Collins said the total cost of the survey is expected to be less than \$1,000.

Action Also Taken

Other action taken at the Board's lengthy session, which began at 3 p.m. Friday, includes construction by the county of a 25-foot launching ramp and a 210-foot float for stiff rental.

The board also decided to charge a flat rate of \$55 yearly for wharfage on the county dock for inboard boats exceeding 16 feet and a charge to charter boat operators of 10 cents per person. A vehicle parking charge and a boat storage charge were also authorized. Revenue from the assessments is for improvements and maintenance, Collins said.

The board approved its 1952-53 budget of \$25,000, including \$9,740 in salaries and wages, \$1,880 general expenses and \$13,380 capital outlay. Special project funds include \$2,000 for replanting the burned-over Britt Nichols Park and \$5,000 for improvements at Winchester Bay to help put the park on a self-supporting basis.

15 Soviet Jets Fall To Allies

SEOUL, Korea — American Sabre jets destroyed at least 15 Russian-built MIG-15 jets this week with the loss of only one sweeping fighter in air combat, the Fifth Air Force announced Saturday.

Seven United Nations planes were lost during the week to ground fire and other causes.

In its regular weekly summary the Fifth Air Force said 15 MIGs were destroyed, one probably destroyed, and ten damaged. It said one American Sabre jet was lost in air combat, four Allied planes lost to Red ground fire, and three lost from unknown causes, possibly mechanical failure.

Some of the U.N. pilots were picked up and returned to Allied lines.

Overcast and scattered clouds blanketed most of North Korea Saturday. United Nations planes concentrated on the Red front lines.

Four ground-hugging F-80 Shooting Stars roared out of the mist in a deadly surprise attack on a Communist mortar platoon on the Eastern Front.

Pilots said they killed 50 soldiers and knocked out 12 gun positions.

The attack was north of the Punch Bowl, where the Reds have heavy concentrations of mortar and artillery batteries.
