

New Shop Unit Or Class Rooms School Problem

discussion on the Senior High School shop building, but the matter had to be shelved until later in the week when more information was available.

Architect Freeman said he would speed preliminary arrangements for the construction of the Fullerton School additions in order to make them ready for the contractors by April 1. The board then voted to take contract bids at the regular board meeting May 5.

Shop Building Raises Question

The snag that slowed an immediate decision on the shop building at the High School was the question of what use should be made of the second story in the school year 1952-53. The debatable point as stated by Paul Helweg was: Which is more "critical"—the pressing need for increased classrooms or immediate complete use of the building for shop purposes?

Charles Allen, general shop teacher at the high school, objectively stated that the school was in need of facilities for three more class courses than the six currently in operation. He was reluctant to make a definite recommendation until further information was available as to the amount to be spent.

He stated that the two-story pumice building would be taken up with two shops on the ground level for auto mechanics and general shop courses, and the second level would be divided into five classrooms.

Roseburg School Superintendent Paul Elliott recommended the upper part of the structure be used in the next year for temporary classrooms to take care of the estimated addition of 150 students in 1952. He asked if the entire building is used next year for shop purposes, "What are you going to do with the rest of the students?"

Clarenbach replied that he felt the need for shop facilities was more "critical" than class room space, since many students were more likely to benefit from doing

"something with their hands" than sitting through some other class. He expressed the opinion that the excess students could be absorbed in the present classroom space, and added that such an action would be less expensive than a later conversion from temporary classrooms to shop facilities.

Member N. D. Johnson brought the question to an impasse by saying, "That's out. We need the classrooms." The matter was tabled until the architect could discuss it with Principal George Erickson, Elliott and the shop heads.

Completed plans give the entire building to shop courses, while added classrooms will be installed in the physical education addition. But little hope is apparent for the construction of the physical education plant before 1953.

County Mineral Deposits Topic Of Speaker Here

The key to an area's economic stability is its mineral resources, according to Les Childs, local geologist, who spoke before the Chamber of Commerce at its forum luncheon Monday noon.

Childs, who has made an exhaustive study of Douglas County, said he is assured that there are vast mineral resources in the county which would be economically feasible to develop.

Most of it is of low grade quality, but minerals in evidence are chrome, manganese, tin, sulphur, nickel and copper. The fact that the supply of these minerals from outside sources is becoming scarce makes it possible to develop low grade deposits economically.

Much of our manganese comes from India and tin from Malaya. If these sources should be cut, the economy of the United States would be greatly affected, said Childs. Manganese is very essential in the production of steel.

Most of our nickel comes from Canada, but the supply there is becoming exhausted, making it possible to develop low grade ores such as that found in Nickel Mountain, near Riddle, according to Childs.

Only a small part of Douglas County has been mapped geologically, he said. He advised the Chamber of Commerce to work through the Mineral Club and enlist the assistance of loggers by giving them information that would make them aware of mineral deposits which could be developed.

On large mining development would play a great part in reshaping Douglas county's economy, he pointed out. Production of aluminum changed Oregon from an importing to an exporting state in 1946, he said.

Poor Truman Lonely, Freak In Public Eye

Among the noteworthy omissions: There are only fleeting and non-committal references to Gen. Eisenhower.

After World War II, Truman praised Eisenhower to the skies and promised to help him get anything he wanted — including the Presidency in 1948.

Now, in 1952, Eisenhower is in the running for the Republican presidential nomination although not personally an active candidate.

And Truman, in the new book, does not mention Eisenhower on his list of the "greatest generals" while saying Gen. Bradley, chairman of the joint chiefs of Staff, "tops them all."

Similarly, Truman has nothing significant to say about Eisenhower's chief rival for this year's GOP nomination, Sen. Taft of Ohio.

Admits Pendergast Aid
Truman makes no bones of the fact that he was sponsored in politics by the Pendergast organization.

But he says the Kansas City machine never influenced him as a public official. "There is nothing I detest so much as a crooked politician or corrupt government official," he says.

And he adds, speaking of the corruption charges made against his own administration: "But the type of businessman who is a fixer is even lower in my estimation."

And he proposes that every public official — including members of congress — whose salary is more than \$10,000 a year be required to make public "exactly what his outside income is."

Truman's "clean-up" chief, Newbold Morris, is quizzing many of officials in the executive branch about their incomes now.

He blasts John L. Lewis as "a demagogue in action" who "cannot face the music when the tune is not to his liking."

Timber Sales In '52 May Bring Douglas Big Sum

EUGENE — Walter H. Horning, chief of the bureau of land management forestry division, has estimated that Douglas county may receive \$2,000,000 this year as its annual share in timber sale proceeds from Oregon and California reversion lands. Lane County, according to Horning's estimates, may net more than \$1,000,000.

A legal battle is being fought over the division of O&C sales returns between the federal government and the 18 western Oregon counties in which the timber stands are located. Legislation also has been introduced in the congress to settle the controversy.

In previous years the counties have shared 50 per cent of O&C sales proceeds on the basis of their respective populations. However, Horning has indicated likelihood of a 75 per cent share for the counties this year. That is the percentage they have claimed as their due in legal actions against the bureau of land management.
