

Radio 'Ham' Training Taken By Air Scouts

Scouting is reaching a new height in Roseburg. Scoutmaster Ira Byrd of the Roseburg Air Explorer Scout unit reports that an even dozen boys between the ages of 14 and 16 are now training to become radio "hams."

This curriculum has been included in the basic training course for air scouts which also includes navigation, meteorology and civil air regulations. The course is an eight-week affair under the tutelage of Eugene Roelle. Classes are held in the Baptist Church basement every Thursday night between 7:30 and 9:00. With this as the basic course, the boys hope to achieve enough proficiency to secure class

B licenses in code and radio telephone. The Air Scouts were formed in December of 1950 and have been thriving since. Although no actual flying instructions are included in the training of these Air Scouts, but, as Byrd puts it, "We are laying the groundwork for pre-flight."

Driving School Start To Have Later Date

The driving school, which the Junior Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring, has been postponed until the last of April or first of May, depending on the weather, reports President Sid Moon. Dates and rules will be announced later. The course will be open to all interested persons and will last for six weeks.

Air Force Reserve School Planned Apr. 5

High-level school of Air Force Reservists will be held at the 2347th Air Force Reserve Training Center, Long Beach Municipal Airport, Long Beach, Calif., for two weeks beginning April 5 and ending April 19. The school is being conducted by Major General William E. Hall, commanding general of the Fourth Air Force, Hamilton Air Force Base.

Some 160 officers from Volunteer Air Reserve training units in the Fourth Air Force area (eight western states) will attend. The majority of these officers are successful business men and key individuals in that area, actively engaged in special training so as to increase their proficiency as Reserve Officers in today's expanding Air Force.

The two-week course will parallel that offered to officers attending the command and staff schools at the Air University, Maxwell Air Force Base, Ala. The course will also give reservists information about methods of promotion, retention and retirement.

Guest speakers will include such prominent laymen as Sam Hayes, noted radio news commentator, and Dr. James I. Quillen of Stanford University's School of Education.

The Lookingglass School District will hold a special election Tuesday, March 25, from 2 to 8 p.m. to vote on a \$35,000 bond issue. Funds would be used to install a furnace for heating the upper grade school rooms and the gymnasium and for purchase of other modern equipment needed to standardize the school. The election will be held in the cafeteria room in the basement of the upper grade school building. All eligible voters in the district are urged to turn out. Registration 30 days prior to the election and residence in the district for at least six months are voting requirements.

Michael J. Murphy, Umpqua Pupil, Dies

Michael James (Mike) Murphy, 7-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Delmar Murphy of Umpqua, died suddenly at his home early Tuesday.

Mike, the oldest son of the Murphys, had attended school as usual on Monday. He visited a dentist that day to have a baby tooth extracted. Several hours later, he reportedly complained of a violent headache and lapsed into a coma, according to Holt Grimes, coroner.

A doctor, summoned by his parents, failed to revive the child, and he died at 3 a.m. Tuesday. Grimes said it had not been determined if an autopsy would be necessary.

Born July 12, 1944, at Cottage Grove, he came with his parents to Umpqua when two weeks old. He was in the second grade at Umpqua.

He is survived by his parents; one sister, Peggy; two brothers, Pat and Bill; and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Lansing Sr., Cottage Grove.

Services will be held Friday at 2 p.m. at the Methodist Church in Sutherlin, with the Rev. Lloyd Whitford officiating. Interment will follow in the family plot at Cole Valley Cemetery. Stearns Mortuary is in charge of arrangements.

West Coast Assn. Of Lumbermen Sets Meeting

A delegation of lumbermen from this county will travel to Portland next Thursday, March 27, for the annual business and stockholders' meeting of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association. Leading the local contingent are the following lumbermen who are members of the board of directors of the nation's largest lumber trade association: Henry Jacobson, Roseburg and E. G. Whipple, Drain.

More than 250 are expected, according to Hillman Lundstrom, Portland, WCLA president. "This is the most important lumber industry session since the war," he said. "Problems of major concern to the economy of the entire Pacific west will come up for consideration."

Headlining the luncheon meeting will be Portland banker, E. C. Sammons, who will talk about mortgage money, credits and inflation as they affect lumber. "Boards and Dollars by the Billions" will be his title. At the annual banquet, always a colorful affair, James K. Knudson, Washington, D. C., Interstate Commerce Commissioner and Defense Transport Administrator, will talk of car shortages, inter-coastal shipping, shipping rules on lumber and what may happen to the nation's railroads in the event of all-out war. "The Agony Four" northwest barber shop quartette champions for three years will entertain the visiting lumbermen.

H. V. Simpson, executive vice president of WCLA, will lead off the business session with a presentation of plans for the industry's national magazine advertising, literature and promotion in the field of home buildings, schools, farm buildings, churches, and industrial structures.

Douglas Fir Sawlogs Hold Market Price

CORVALLIS (AP) — Buying was sharply curtailed on the Willamette Valley pulpwood market for the week ending March 15, but prices were mostly unchanged.

The Oregon State College Extension Service farm-forest products report said Douglas fir sawlogs and other forest products were generally unchanged.

The usual spring market for Douglas fir tanning bark has failed to materialize, the report said.

Two Portlanders Face Liens On Income Tax

PORTLAND (AP) — On the final day for filing 1951 income tax returns, the government filed liens against two Portlanders for taxes it claims are due for earlier dates. It also filed releases for several others.

Internal Revenue Collector Hugh Earle filed liens for \$53,775 against Morris Rogoway and for \$51,588 against Harry H. Hoffman. The complaint says the government contends the money is due for 1942 through 1947. The sums include interest.

Exchange Pastor Is Scheduled At Local Church

First Methodist Church of Roseburg, together with almost 250 other Methodist Churches, of Oregon, Washington and Idaho will cooperate in the United Evangelistic Mission of Methodism, which begins its second phase on Sunday, March 23, announced W. A. MacArthur, pastor.

The first series of these meetings came to a fitting climax in six metropolitan centers last Sunday with capacity crowds in civic centers in such cities as Portland, Seattle, Spokane, Twin Falls and Pocatello. Over 3,000 persons were received into membership in the Methodist Church during the week by the profession of their faith. An additional 2,000 united with the Methodist Church in these western states by letters of transfer, said the Rev. MacArthur.

The Mission is a cooperative program wherein every minister in these three states is called upon to assist another pastor for a week in his church. It combines preaching services every evening and visitation teams contacting families in their home with the personal witness, "Come with us to Christ!"

Over 25 of these missions have been held across the United States in the last three years with literally hundreds of thousands of individuals making a definite stand for Christianity and the Methodist Church, he said.

Guest preacher for First Methodist Church, Roseburg, for the week will be the Rev. Dr. Roy A. Fedje of the Rose City Park Methodist Church of Portland. Dr. Fedje will also lead a training seminar for neighboring Methodist pastors and their guest leaders from the Umpqua Valley, every morning during the mission.
