reason—Sen. Taft has withdrawn from the contest in this state."

### Stassen Adds Blast

Harold E. Stassen, who also is entered in the New Jersey primary, was a 220,000-vote winner over Eisenhower in the Minnesota GOP primary Tuesday. Stassen's name was on the ballot.

Stassen said Taft's withdrawal is "a confession of the weakness of his candidacy when it is submitted to the will of the people."

He told a news conference at Milwaukee that Taft's action was "undoubtedly influenced by his very weak showing in the Minnesota primary on Tuesday."

Eisenhower rolled up 106,788 votes—37.2 of the GOP total—with 3,559 of the 3,769 precincts reported.

Stassen, whose name was on the ballot as a favorite son candidate, led with 44.6 percent—128,134 votes.

Sen. Aiken (R-Vt.), said Taft is "just about out" of the Republican presidential race unless the Ohioan can win decisively in Wisconsin April 1.

Sen. Watkins (R-Utah), predicted "a horse race" between Taft and Eisenhower all the way to the July nominating convention.

### Eight-Unit Addition Being Built On Lodge

M. L. Veatch, Portland, owner of the lodge, said the units would cost an estimated \$50,000. M and S Construction Co., Sutherlin, will do the building.

returns. He said he'll answer the question of what he will do when the request reaches him.

5. He did not want to comment on the threatened steel strike since the matter is still in the hands of the Wage Stabilization Board.

6. He would not comment on what he thought of some congressional committees because it might be unprintable. This was in reply to a question as to whether it wasn't illogical for congressional committees to "stigmatize" some witnesses for not foreseeing a Soviet menace in the 1930s when the government was considering a loan as late as 1945.

Truman met reporters in the lobby of a Navy building. The President's generally cheerful air was in sharp contrast with the bluntness of some of his language. He was attired in a blue cotton suit with a light blue sports shirt open at the collar. He kidded with reporters as to their behavior and generally had a good time. But he threw down virtually everything McKinney had told reporters here Wednesday.

### McKinney Reputed

One of McKinney's statements was this: "I am frankly of the opinion, and it is only my personal opinion, that his (the President's decision) will be predicated on the success or failure of resolving the Korean situation satisfactorily."

McKinney said at another point that Korea would be an "important factor" in the President's decision.

Asked about McKinney's statements, the President said Korea enters not into the politics of this country—it has no bearing whatever on what he decides to do.

Told that McKinney had said he expected to have an answer from him before May 15, Truman said he personally would set the date himself.

### Wage Board Chairman Collapses At Parley

WASHINGTON (AP) — The steel wage dispute took a newly critical turn Thursday with the collapse of the chairman of the Wage Stabilization Board and the temporary suspension of deliberations aimed at heading off a nationwide strike.

Chairman Nathan P. Feinsinger of the WSB, keeled over at 6:30 a.m. EST Thursday after an all night session of trying to reach and public members of the 18-man agreement among labor, industry board.

A doctor said he was fatigued, and the board recessed until 2 p.m. EST.

The strike is set for Sunday midnight. The union contends the union shop already prevails in a great part of American industry, and in a sizeable portion of the steel industry.

### FENCE BARS REFUGEES

VIENNA (AP) — The American-sponsored newspaper Winner Kurier said Thursday Czech workers are constructing a wire fence along the Czech-Austrian border to prevent the escape of refugees. Hungary built a 12-foot-high fence on the Austrian border two years ago for the same purpose.
