

Halbrook Scores Record In 'A' Tournament Game

EUGENE — Lincoln's 7-foot-1-inch tower wasted no time in setting after the records at the annual Oregon class A high school basketball tournament.

The big boy, Wade Halbrook, ran up 40 points as he and his teammates from Lincoln of Portland drubbed Salem in the first round Wednesday, 70-43.

That bettered the old record of 39, established in 1947 by Loyd Buettgenbach of Hood River and tied by Halbrook last year.

It shot his season total to 999 in 24 games, increasing the chance that he will make 1,000 this season. He also is after his own tournament record of 125 points.

There was only one upset in the opening round, but that was a spine-tingling affair that saw Bend come from behind in the final quarter to nose out Klamath Falls, 53-54. Klamath Falls had been ranked No. 5 in the final Associated Press state poll of the season. Bend was unranked.

Golfer O'Sullivan Defeats Murray

PINEHURST, N.C. — They replayed the 1951 Women's North and South Golf Tournament final Thursday—only this time it was in the second round.

Thanks to the U. S. Golf Association numerical draw, Pat O'Sullivan and her dearest friend, Mae Murray, met head-on in the feature match of the upper bracket.

A year ago, Pat, from Orange, Conn., won her second successive North and South in a thrilling 1 up final match with Mae, the Rutland, Vt., Miss., who two years ago was national runnerup.

Thursday's meeting was their sixth in match play, with Mae holding the edge, 3-2, thanks to a 3 and 1 decision in Miami's Helen Lee Doherty tournament early this winter.

Both girls played well in Wednesday's first round. Pat had little trouble handling Mrs. George Bilowick, Butler, Pa., 6 and 5. Mae was a bit sharper in her 7 and 6 conquest of Mrs. S. H. Patterson of Pinehurst.

Otherwise, the favorites did as expected. Mary Lena Faulk, medalist from Thomasville, Ga., Curtis Cup Player Grace DeNoss of Corvallis, Ore., and Mrs. Julius A. Page Jr., of Chapel Hill, N. C., cup alternate, who has won seven times here, led the parade.

Thursday's lower half feature sent Miss DeMoss against capable Edean Anderson, Helena, Mont.

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Danny Nardico Whips Wagner In 10 Rounds

CLEVELAND — Pounding Danny Nardico of Tampa, Fla., gained a 10-round unanimous decision over Dick Wagner of Toppenish, Wash., Wednesday night in a light heavyweight bout that excited just about everybody.

Nardico, at 177, knocked Wagner down for nine counts twice in the fourth and again in the seventh. But the crowd cheered the game Wagner, 173, who gave Danny his lumps in the fifth and sixth rounds, and struggled vainly for a knockout in the 10th.

Nardico pocketed \$3,800, plus an unannounced cut of television cash. Wagner also received \$3,800 and a TV cut.

American Legion Official Speaks At Conference

Dr. John Haskins, Veterans Hospital manager, received more than \$600 from the American Legion Tuesday for construction of a hard tennis court at the hospital.

Hollis C. Hull, Oregon department commander of the Legion, said it was his "observation that the Roseburg Veterans Hospital was one of the best managed units of the veterans administration."

Dr. Haskins was given the money during a conference of District 10 officials, who congregated in Roseburg to observe the 33rd anniversary of the Legion.

Hull then turned his attention briefly to the universal military training bill now being proposed. The American Legion, Hull said, has long advocated enactment of a universal training program as a step toward creating a standing defense force.

Reduction in cost and the solid front that would confront aggres-

sors were the main reasons cited by Hull for such a plan.

He felt that universal military training four years ago would have reduced the aggressors tendency to impose forces upon helpless nations.

But Hull stressed the need for keeping it within control of civilians and said the American Legion had sponsored revisions that would insure such management.

During his speech, Hull took a crack at the citizens committee report.

The American Legion, he explained, has been working for years to raise the medical standards at Veterans hospitals and the plan proposed by the committee would destroy this work.

It was his contention that supervision would be placed under a Washington bureau and men acquainted with local problems would be replaced.

He urged the Legion to accept

this plan as a challenge and meet it with determination to insure the country's security.
