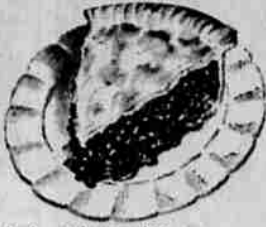

Yoncalla Telephone Co. Lists Collection Change

Rural users of Yoncalla Telephone Company's services will be billed the first of each month, according to Manager Mrs. Kittie Jobe.

A new schedule states that farmer stations will be charged individually each month, and the bills are to be paid in advance.

Failure to pay the service charge within 30 days after the bill has been received, will be considered cause for disconnection, Mrs. Jobe said. Telephones will remain disconnected until the bill has been paid in full.

Originally, farmer lines were considered a separate unit and line secretaries collected and paid the company in January and June.
