## YOUR BODY

Tuberculosis is found in all countries. It is more common in cities, with their congestion, Malnutrition and other tendencies to body depletions. It is less common but not unknown in the country with its sunshine, open spaces and natural foods. However, in some country communities which have a depleted soil and where the food does not contain sufficient minerals for body nutrition, very obstinate cases of tuberculosis are found.

It is seldom found in higher altitudes. All races are subject to it, but Indians and Negroes are more susceptible than others. This in turn may be due to the fact that under so-called civilized control, these two races are removed from their natural habitat or are made to live under, to them unnatural conditions so that their vitality is victims. Nearly ten per cent of all deaths in the United States are from tuberculosis.

The disease is seldom inherited. A predisposition to it may be inherited but it is highly probable that the constant association with some other case in the family is more frequently the cause. Modes of transmission are by inhalation, ingestion of contaminated food such as milk, by handling objects which have been used by tubercular patients, or by inoculation. The mucous membrane of the mouth and nose, the lungs and the tonsils are common avenues of entrance.

The tubercle bacillus (Germ) may live almost indefinitely in a dried state and may be carried through the air as dust. A more careful cleaning of streets and allies of congested districts do much to reduce the incidence of this disease in crowded cities. Files are responsible for the dissemination of

## New Turbine Utilizes Waste

Sawdust-fed gas turbine engines and combustion efficiencies of 92.5 to 99 per cent have recently been developed at Oregon Forest Products Laboratory, Corvallis.

A paper presented before the American Society of Mechanical Engineers of the University of Washington predicted that the new process may enable sawmills to generate greater operating power from waste wood.

The heat release rate from the new engine is about 15 times as great as that released from most boiler installations using wood fuel, according to the report.

Laboratory studies indicate that Oregon sawmills produce a larger volume of wood waste fuel than would be necessary to provide power requirements.

## Red Cross Funds At Present Exceed Total At This Time Year Ago, Drive's Head Says

Funds collected during the present Red Cross drive slightly exceed the amount taken in at this time in 1951, reports Drive Chairman Jim Aiken.

The quota for Douglas County has been set at \$18,000. But Aiken said a more intensive program was required to complete solicitation in sawmills and the downtown area.

It was asked that committee members turn in a complete solicitation report by March 26.

Mrs. R. E. Herman, executive secretary of the county chapter, said that 30 per cent, or \$5,143, would be sent to national headquarters if the quota was reached.

The remainder, she said, would remain in the county treasury. County activities determine the amount that shall be retained in a locality, she explained.

Mrs. Herman said the money going to Washington was earmarked for the disaster fund, overseas projects and international activities.

## Past Relief Listed

Here are some of the expenses born by the local Red Cross in 1950 and 1951:

1950—For relief of 196 families dispossessed by the flood, \$17,000 was spent.

1951—In August—during the Hubbard Creek forest fire—seven families were aided at a cost of \$7,200; and in December, \$1,299.46 was sent to Reedsport for benefit of 41 persons who were burned out.

The greatest portion of that money was obtained from the national Red Cross, but \$5,800 has been returned to headquarters by the county, she said.

## Oregon Voter's Pamphlet, Soon In Mails, Represents Huge Task Costing \$45,000

SALEM (AP) — Oregon's Voter's Pamphlet, that unique publication which gives every politician a chance to puff himself up all he wants to, goes into the mails next week.

With a circulation of 800,000 in 45 separate editions, the pamphlet is a tremendous job for the popular Irishman who has been doing it since 1915.

David O'Hara, chief clerk of the State Elections Division, is up to his ears in work, editing and supervising the pamphlet.

In fact, O'Hara was so busy last Monday he forgot it was St. Patrick's Day. He didn't have a bit of green on, which is an unpardonable sin for a loyal Irishman like O'Hara.

Dave, as everybody calls him, will be 65 years old next month. That's retirement age, but it would be hard to think of the Elections Bureau being run without "Mr. Elections" himself.

Since nobody knows the election laws like O'Hara does, his boss, Secretary of State Earl T. Newbery, probably will ask that Dave be kept on beyond retirement age.

45 Editions Needed  
In the Voter's Pamphlet, every candidate gets a chance to put his picture, beliefs, history and platform before the voters. There are 45 editions in order to cut down the printing job. Thus, legislative candidates have their statements circulated only within their own districts.

It will cost \$45,000 to get out the current number. The candidates pay \$7,500 for space, leaving a deficit of \$37,500. But O'Hara, and most other people, think it is well worth it.

"The pamphlet, including all printing, editing and postage, costs only 5.8 cents a copy. It's an educational periodical, and where else can you find an educational document so inexpensive?" O'Hara asks.

Dave is the censor of the pamphlet, as the law bans libelous, obscene and defamatory matter, as well as matter which is prejudicial to any race or religion.

When he comes across such objectionable matter, he suggests to the candidate that he delete it. He never runs into any trouble on that score.

Dave is a Republican, and you might think he would run into trouble with Democrats. He doesn't. Democrats are just as loud in their praise of Dave's fairness as the Republicans are.

He is extremely careful not to make mistakes in getting out the pamphlet, which goes to every registered voter.

"Before I came here, the statement of a delegate to a national party convention from the state at large was left out of the pamphlet. It wasn't noticed until the pamphlet had been distributed and the candidate complained.

"The department had to print and mail separate copies of the statement to every voter of his party. The extra postage cost \$4,000.

## Bill Misrepresented, Cong. Ellsworth Says

pattern of the lands concerned." He points out that the bill "has an exchange provision for blocking up lands of the Forest Service separate from O & C."

"The indemnity lands bill in its present form has been before Congress for at least five years," says Ellsworth. "Anyone sufficiently interested in this legislation to go out and lobby against it certainly ought to know what is in the bill."

## Still Hopeful of Approval

Previously, the congressman reports, the bill has twice received favorable reports from the House Committee on Public Lands, but in each session it came too late to be enacted in the "end-of-session jams." By earlier introduction of the bill at the current session, Ellsworth is hopeful of passage.

The Public Lands Subcommittee of the House Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs will hold a hearing on the bill April 2, Ellsworth reports. County courts of each of the 18 land grant counties have been notified of the hearing.

A companion bill, introduced in the Senate by Senator Guy Cordon, has received a favorable report.

The lands in question are included in a 10-mile strip on each side of the original land grant made to the Oregon & California railroad company to be used in financing rail line construction in Oregon. Because some of the lands contained in the original grant had been occupied by settlers, the additional grant was authorized.

When provision was made for management of the re-vested O & C lands by the Department of Interior and Department of Agriculture, through the U.S. Forest Service, each claimed jurisdiction. Because of the dispute, the acreage involved became known as "controversial" lands. A joint management system now is followed, while legislation to establish permanent jurisdiction is pending.

Oregon counties are demanding their share of approximately \$5,000,000 accumulated from timber sales from the disputed lands but held in the federal treasury awaiting congressional decision. As the Forest Service pays 25 per cent of gross revenue, while the counties now are entitled to 75 per cent from O & C lands, the issue is of much importance to the affected counties.

## Steel Industry Attacks Proposed Wage Boost

NEW YORK — An industry spokesman said Saturday major steel companies would begin individual negotiations Monday with the CIO United Steelworkers Union on the Wage Stabilization Board's contract recommendations.

The union has accepted the WSB proposals and has threatened a strike April 8 unless the companies accept them.

"There will be no industry-wide bargaining," the spokesman said. "The bargaining will be company by company."

The steel industry in a joint statement Friday denounced the WSB proposals for a basic 18 1/2 cent-an-hour wage increase and a union shop. The industry said the suggested wage boost would require steel price increases up to \$12 a ton.

The suit had been brought by the State Grange and several trucking firms.
