A violin concert by Claire Hodgkins, winner of the Portland, Ore., Young Artists auditions in 1951, will be given in the Junior Academy auditorium March 29. The program begins at 8:15 P.M.

Miss Hodgkins has appeared as soloist with the Portland Symphony Orchestra, Hood River Symphony, Lewis and Clark College Symphony and Portland Chamber Orchestra. She has concertized throughout the Northwest. The young violinist is an artist student of Boris Sirpo, renowned Finnish conductor and composer.

Miss Hodgkins, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Hodgkins, 4746

N. E. Flanders St., Portland, played her first recital at four years of age. She was a member of the Portland Junior Symphony and appeared as soloist when she was 15. She is at present a student at Lewis and Clark College where Boris Sirpo is conductor of the College Symphony Orchestra. Last summer Miss Hodgkins won a scholarship sponsored by Mu Phi Epsilon in a contest judged by Samuel Applebaum and Arthur Loesser.

Critics have been generous with their compliments of the young artist. The "Oregon Journal" music editor, commenting on the Vieux-

temps concerto, wrote: "Her technique was more than equal to the works virtuoso demands and, especially in the adagio, she drew a beautiful and individual tone from her instrument. She won several curtain calls from enthusiastic listeners."

Miss Hodgkins' accompanist, Violet Oulbegian, was graduated from the University of Michigan and has done graduate work in New York City. She has recently been on the faculty at Oregon State College. Both Miss Hodgkins and Miss Oulbegian are members of Mu Phi Epsilon, National Honorary Music Sorority.

Mrs. C. S. Heinline, 1152 Madison Ave., has been selected to attend a music seminar to be held at the Royal Academy of Music in London, England, beginning June 19, it was announced today.

Mrs. Heinline will sail from Quebec on June 11, aboard R.M.S. Franconia. She will proceed directly to London to attend the seminar which is being given under the auspices of the Royal Academy and St. Louis Institute of Music. Music teachers attending are chosen from Progressive Series piano teachers all over the United States on the basis of their contribution to the music development of their community.

This will be the tenth session to be held in foreign countries. Previous sessions have been held in Paris, London, Leipzig, Munich, Vienna and Mexico City. The purpose of the seminar is to study the educational methods employed in

music teaching in foreign countries and to foster international understanding among members of the music teaching profession.

Mrs. Heinline will attend classes under such noted English music personalities as R. S. Thatcher, Harold Craxton, Myers Foggins, Thurston Dart, Denis Matthews, Harry Isaacs, Frederic Jackson and Peter Latham. All are members of the faculty of the Royal Academy. Mr. John P. Blake, Jr., president of St. Louis Institute of Music, will conduct the group to London and on a tour of the continent.

Upon completion of the seminar, Mrs. Heinline will leave London for a tour of Holland, Belgium, Germany, Switzerland and France, visiting the various music shrines of those countries. She will return to this country by way of Quebec about July 25, and plans to incorporate the benefits of her European study in her classes which will resume this fall.
