

Device Offered To Guard Seeds In Reforesting

A cylindrical wire mesh device may be the answer to a lot of problems connected with reforestation of logged-off timberland, Forest Researcher Lloyd Hayes indicated Friday night.

Hayes, head of the Forest Service Research Center at Roseburg, addressed the Society of American Foresters at its monthly meeting in the Umpqua Hotel.

The device, made out of window screen, is slightly more than an inch in diameter and five inches long. It's being experimented with by the research center.

The forester explained the cost and unavailability of labor made planting of nursery stock difficult. It's easier to plant seeds but that brings more problems.

Among the problems, he said, were birds and rodents which eat seeds, dying out of seeds during a drought, diseases caused by fungus, cutworms, soil deficiency and others.

By placing seeds and varying amounts of soil, fertilizer and other materials in the cylinders, the conditions of germination can be controlled, Hayes explained. The wire screens protect the seeds from birds, rodents and worms.

Other Problems Discussed
Among other forest management problems discussed was soil and water shed management.

"It is going to be highly important to conduct timber harvesting practices with a minimum of damage to the productivity of the soil and with a minimum of erosion to keep sediments out of the streams," Hayes said. "Water values are too high to risk damaging by poor forest practices."

The reclamation of brush fields

is another problem encountered by foresters, Hayes said.
"There are thousands of square miles of brush fields in Southwest Oregon," he commented. "These are producing nothing—they don't even protect the soil well and some of them are poor water shed cover. Many could be producing valuable timber."

Also speaking was George A. James, forest researcher, who discussed management practices for Port Orford cedar.

These metals have been known for years, but not until recently were processing and fabricating techniques developed that allowed production in substantial quantities.

Discussing causes of delinquency, both agreed that automobiles as such do not promote delinquency. Anne declared that if a youth is going to be a delinquent he'd be so whether a car was involved or not.

"Twenty years ago," Frank said, "high school students were under closer supervision from their parents, teachers and the neighborhood. Now youth is not given that supervision."

Asked by interviewer Bob Grant about the liquor problem, Anne replied that some at the high school do drink, and Frank added that he believed many of the tales told around town about the wild drinking parties participated in by students are "exaggerated" with each successive telling.
