EUGENE — Bob Altenhofen of Central Catholic was named to the Oregon Class A High School basketball tournament all-star team for the third successive year Saturday night.
He is the third player in tourney history to be selected three times. Others were Glen Sanford, Salem, 1930-31-32, and Ted Sarpola, Astoria, 1934-35-36.
Wade (Swede) Halbrook, Lincoln's record-breaking scorer, was named for the second successive year.

All except Crabtree are seniors.
