Film Impounded As Propaganda Of Communism

TWIN FALLS, Idaho — A film distributed by Washington State College was impounded by the Twin Falls school board Friday and sent to the House Un-American Activities Committee as a example of Communist propaganda.

The film, "Peoples of the U.S.S.R.," was shown to grade school pupils before the school board and members of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce viewed it.

Claude Detweiler of the Chamber of Commerce called it "diabolical propaganda and a clever scheme to influence the children."

Arthur Kleinkopf, curriculum director of Twin Falls school, said a full scale investigation will be requested. The film was ordered by school officials nearly a year ago from the film library at WSC.

Glen Jones, director of the Community College at WSC, said the same film was sent to Twin Falls last fall and returned "in the regular way."

He said the film was produced in Russia in 1946 by Julien Brien, an American described as "perhaps America's foremost producer of documentary films."

According to the catalog description, the film "portrays the many racial groups comprising the Soviet Union and gives the overall concept of the vastness of the country and its distinctly separate people."

Jones said the film is available at either WSC, University of Washington or Central Washington College of Education.

Children At Play Near Streets Bear Watching

A warning to parents to keep close check on children when they play near streets was given by Secretary of State Newbury.

Spring weather, Newbury said, always means children will be playing outdoors, and increases the chance that they will dart into streets in front of oncoming cars or come from behind a parked auto.

During the first six months of 1951, 11 children under 14 years of age were killed and 228 were injured in pedestrian-motor vehicle accidents. Seventeen such mishaps were recorded in all of 1950.

Parents, Newbury said, must teach children to play away from streets, and to cross only at cross walks, after making certain there is no oncoming traffic.

Even if drivers stay within speed limits, he added, it is sometimes impossible for them to stop in time to avoid hitting a child if he suddenly darts directly in front of the car.
