## Federal Aid Extension For Highways Approved

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House Public Works subcommittee Wednesday approved a two-year extension of the federal-aid highway program at a cost of \$1,100,000,000.

The program is now due to expire a year from next June 30. The full Public Works Committee is expected to take up next week the bill calling for the extension. Money to pay for the program would have to be appropriated later under separate legislation.

Mrs. H. F. Beauchamp is in charge of staging with Mrs. T. L. Goodwin in charge of the schedule. Mrs. J. M. Boyles will be in charge of classification. Mrs. Frank Ashley is serving as publicity chairman and Mrs. B. C. Elliott is hospitality chairman. Mrs. Mabel Wilson will be in charge of registration. A plant sale will be held with Mrs. Otto Gosnell as chairman and Mrs. E. J. Sullivan will be in charge of the candy sale. Mrs. Earl Bleile is in charge of the special exhibit.

Courtesy exhibits will be by Moore's Nursery, Mrs. Foster Butler, Umpqua Florists, Moyer's Nursery, Mrs. P. E. Beaver, Fern Florists and Garden Valley Nursery and Landscaping. The Douglas County extension office will have an educational exhibit. Door prizes will be furnished by the Douglas County Farm Bureau and Oerding's Seed Store.

Rules of the flower show:  
1. Competition is open to all amateurs.  
2. Entries will be accepted April 4 at 10 a.m. until 12 noon. Entries must be removed by 5 p.m. April 5. Doors open to the public April 4, at 2 p.m. and close at 9 p.m., and April 5 they will be open at 9 a.m. and close at 4 p.m.

3. Only one entry may be made in each class by the same person.  
4. Arrangements must be the work of the exhibitor.

5. All horticultural specimens must be grown by the exhibitor under garden conditions.

6. Only judges, clerks and the general chairman will be allowed in the room during judging.

7. All entries will be judged against perfection. The decision of the judges shall be final.  
8. All entries must be given to the entry committee, who will place them.

9. The show committee is not responsible for containers, although reasonable care will be exercised. All items should be marked with the owners name.  
10. When possible, label speci-

men with botanical and common name.

11. Ribbon awards will be given in each class.  
12. Containers for horticultural specimens will be furnished. The exhibits will include the following:
