

## Steel Parley Resumes In Try To Ban Strike

WASHINGTON (AP) — A bitter scrap among high administration officials over wage policy simmered down Wednesday as steel firms and the CIO Steelworkers returned to negotiations.

A strike of more than 650,000 workers in the vital steel industry is threatened for April 8, only two weeks away. Officials urged both sides to work for a speedy settlement to avert a walkout.

The administration row centered around Defense Mobilization Boss Charles E. Wilson. He touched it off by labeling Wage Stabilization Board proposals for settling the steel wage issue "a serious threat" to inflation controls.

It appeared beyond question that whatever is done about the steel row, it will have a vast influence on the drafting of legislation to extend present economic controls, and the ultimate Congressional debate. The present controls law expires June 30.

Chairman Maybank (D-S. C.), of the Senate Banking Committee said Monday that the steel wage and price boosts might result in kicking out all controls.

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## New Spy Probe Hinted In Grand Jury Session

NEW YORK (AP) — A surprise federal grand jury appearance by Whittaker Chambers has set off reports of a new spy inquiry.

Chambers, one-time Communist courier and principal witness against Alger Hiss, was closeted with the jury for 80 minutes Tuesday.

He wouldn't say afterwards what it was about except for "matters which were familiar to me."

Chambers testified at the Hiss trial that the former State Department aid gave him departmental secrets for a prewar Soviet spy ring.

Hiss, convicted of perjury for denying Chambers' story, is serving a five-year federal prison term, but has petitioned for a new trial.

## Sustained Yield Status Of Fremont Forest Hit

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Engle (D-Calif.) asked the House Agriculture Committee to approve a bill which would abolish the Lakeview, Ore., sustained yield forest unit in Fremont National Forest.

Engle accused the Forest Service of acting "arbitrarily and capriciously" in establishing the unit. He said the boundaries of the unit excluded the Willow Ranch Corp. in Northern California from bidding on timber within the area.

He contended the Willow Ranch Corp. should have been included in the unit.

The committee deferred action on the bill, introduced by Engle, pending further hearings.
