German Chancellor Escapes Bomb Death

BONN, Germany (AP)—A second suspected bomb attempt on the life of Chancellor Konrad Adenauer within 24 hours proved a false alarm late Friday. Federal police gingerly opened a suspicious parcel and found inside a loudly-ticking antique clock. Police and populace were jittery after a mail package addressed to Dr. Adenauer exploded Thursday night at Munich, killing one man and injuring four others.

U.S. Fliers Again Blast Commie Supply Lines

SEOUL, Korea (AP)—Skies cleared over North Korea Friday afternoon and Allied warplanes in force attacked the Reds' battered supply lines. A few B-26 bombers flew through storm clouds in the morning and dropped high explosives on rail and highway traffic. Thursday night B26s blasted 61 Red supply trucks off North Korean highways.

U.S. BUILDING BOMBED

DAMASCUS, Syria (AP)—A bomb blasted the building of the United States Information Service here Friday and an Arab radio operator was killed. Police arrested several suspects but made no announcement concerning an inquiry which got underway immediately.

PHOTOGRAPHERS BANNED

PORTLAND (AP)—Street photographers here are banned in Portland. The City Council voted Tuesday to end their activities after store owners said they caused street litter.

Brother Thought To Have Taken Rap For His Kin

NEW YORK (AP)—Did one loyal brother go to prison to help his "black sheep" brother? That is the question Federal Judge Henry W. Goddard must decide after hearing this story Wednesday from Attorney Benjamin Schmier.

Anthony Piscioia, 28, was "the black sheep of the family. He was always looking for an easy way to make an easy dollar."

But his brother, Rosario, 32, led an "exemplary life."

One day, Anthony asked Rosario to deliver a package. His easy-going brother took the package—and was arrested. It contained narcotics.

Anthony also was arrested—and for him it wasn't the first time. When Rosario shouted his innocence, the U. S. attorney said the maximum sentence would be imposed if the case went to trial.

Anthony urged his brother to plead guilty so that Anthony, who had a record, wouldn't get too stiff a sentence. A lawyer told Rosario the judge probably would give him six months at the most.

Both Plead Guilty So both brothers pleaded guilty to peddling narcotics. Anthony got nine years. Rosario got seven years. They went to prison about a year ago.

Rosario wrote Judge Goddard from prison, saying he was innocent. The case was turned over to the Legal Aid Society and Schmier was assigned.

"I received a letter from Anthony," Schmier told the judge, "and, believe me, it was written in blood. He said his conscience bothered him so much he couldn't sleep nights and he swore his brother was innocent."

After hearing the story, Judge Goddard ordered Rosario to enter a plea of innocent. If the brother proves his case, he will be a free man.

Said the judge: "All I want to see is that justice is done."

MISSION TO VATICAN BLOCKADE PROPOSED

WASHINGTON (AP)—An amendment aimed at blocking the dispatch of any U.S. diplomatic mission to Vatican City without Congressional sanction was written into the State Department money bill Friday by the House Appropriations Committee.

The amendment was adopted by a vote of 19 to 17, with three members recorded as "present," at a closed session of the committee. Members said it was offered by Rep. Preston (D-Ga.)

OPS Orders Freeze On Restaurant Prices WASHINGTON (AP)—Restaurant meal prices have been frozen, effective April 7, at their Feb. 3-9 level. And operators must post by April 25 the ceilings on their main food and drink items.

The Office of Price Stabilization issued the order Thursday night. It said restaurants could change their prices up or down only on OPS orders. These would be based primarily on significant changes in the Bureau of Labor Statistics' monthly wholesale food price index.

Price Stabilizer Ellis Aron said he foresaw no general changes in restaurant prices since food costs are "fairly well stabilized."

Tillamook Burns Now Employ Sixty Convicts SALEM (AP)—The state prison camp in the Tillamook Burns now has 60 convicts, or 10 more than when the camp was started last November, the State Forestry Board said Wednesday.

The board approved sale of \$400,000 worth of bonds to continue the forest rehabilitation program.
