### Blizzard Deals Havoc To Britain

LONDON (AP) — The coldest spring blizzard in 36 years lashed the British Isles Saturday and snow and cold gripped most of Europe.

Shipping in the burning English Channel was virtually at a standstill. A number of small boats sent out distress signals and rescue crews were busy.

Road and rail transportation in Southern England was blocked in many places by drifts piled as high as 10 feet. Three double-decker buses overturned on icy roads but no deaths were reported.

Air transportation into London was slowed. One plane from the United States was five hours late after bucking gale winds.

Winds up to 70 miles an hour lashed the southern coast of England, ripping off roofs, snapping power lines and littering roads with debris.

### Winner-Take-All Bid Planned By Kefauver

OMAHA (AP) — Sen. Kefauver of Tennessee was reported ready Saturday to offer Sen. Kerr of Oklahoma a winner-take-all proposition in Nebraska's primary next Tuesday.

A reliable source said the Tennesseean has decided that all the state's 12 Democratic delegates should be pledged to vote in the national convention for the winner of the popularity contest.

There are 24 candidates running for the 12 delegate posts but the winners will not be legally bound to vote for any candidate for the nomination.

On the Republican front, a furious drive for write-in votes gathered headway in the camps of Sen. Taft of Ohio and Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower. The campaign is being waged by mail, telephone, radio, television and newspaper advertisements.

### Errol Flynn Awarded \$14,000 For Face Slap

NASSAU, Bahamas (AP) — Movie Actor Errol Flynn was awarded 5,000 pounds (\$14,000) and court costs by a Bahamas Supreme Court jury Friday for the face slapping Canadian Millionaire Duncan McMartin gave him in a Nassau bar-room.

Defense Attorney A. F. Adlerley indicated he would appeal the decision to the Privy Council.

Flynn, who sued for 80,000 pounds (\$224,000) said McMartin gave him a "vicious blow" on the face which aggravated an old back injury and kept him from filling a \$200,000 movie contract.

McMartin contended the blow was light and friendly.

### Rotarians Hear Salvation Army Representatives

The purpose of the Salvation Army is to get people to lead a Christian life.

That is what Brigadier William Parkhouse, dean of men at the army's college at San Francisco, told Rotarians Thursday noon in the Umpqua Hotel.

He appeared before Rotarians with seven students from the college who are in Roseburg as part of their training. They are working in cooperation with Lt. D. W. Madson, local Salvation Army officer.

The cadets sang songs and presented instrumental selections.

Parkhouse said it was the conclusion of Salvation Army educators who met in London that "Christianity as disseminated by the army fulfilled the needs of all people regardless of race."

Brig. Parkhouse then humorously explained the difference between the Salvation Army and other armies by telling a joke that originated during World War I.

Two men—a private and a lieutenant—were brought before a court martial board for striking superior officers. The lieutenant explained that a general had stepped on his sore foot, and in his pain and anguish he unintentionally struck the superior. He was reprimanded and excused.

When the private appeared, he told the board that he saw the lieutenant strike the general and then hit the top sergeant because he thought the war was over.

But the war waged by the Salvation Army is never over, the brigadier emphasized. At present, army representatives are working in 97 countries.

Uniforms worn by army members were first donated in England to distinguish them during a period of revolt and dissent, he explained. The British people assigned them ranks that have remained.

Activities of the army include missionary work, social and welfare programs and campaigns to assist persons during emergencies, said the brigadier.

### Truman Speaks Tonight; Urged To Tell Plans

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Truman mounts the political stump Saturday night — and Sen. Maybank (D-S.C.) urged him to "end this confusion" by announcing whether he is going to seek another term.

But Democrats closer to the President seemed to have the general opinion he probably won't tip his hand in an address here (7:30 p.m. PST) at the \$100-a-plate Jefferson-Jackson Day dinner.

They looked for Truman to come up instead with a blast at the Republicans in the "give 'em hell" style of his 1948 campaign.

Along with many other Southern Democrats in Congress, Maybank is supporting Sen. Russell of Georgia for the party's presidential nomination.

The Russel camp's primary goal is to keep Truman from being re-elected, if he decides to run — and the Georgian's backers would like to know Truman's intentions as soon as possible so they can map their strategy.

Maybank said, however, that "aside from any such factor, he (Truman) owes it to the people to say now whether he is going to try for another term." Maybank added:

"The time has come for the President of the United States to put his cards on the table and end this confusion. He should do that in justice to the Democratic party."

### Alleged Commie Sues Studio For Discharge

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Screen Writer Paul Jarrico, who refused last year to tell a congressional committee if he were a Communist, has filed a \$350,000 damage suit against RKO, the studio that subsequently fired him.

He contended in the complaint filed Friday that he was within his constitutional rights in refusing to answer some of the questions asked by members of the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

### Week's Score In Air Battles Favors Allies

SEOUL (AP) — U.S. Fifth Air Force lost nine warplanes over North Korea in the week ended Friday, two of them in air combat with Communist MIG-15 jets.

The weekly Air Force summary Saturday said the bag of Red planes during the same period was four destroyed, three probably destroyed and nine damaged.

Thunderjets dived through holes in overcast skies Saturday and shot up Red bunkers on the Eastern front. Ground-hugging fog obscured most North Korean targets.

B-28 light bombers destroyed 54 supply trucks on North Korean highways Friday night. B-29 Superforts attacked Red rail and highway targets at Sinanju and the rail yards at Hamhung.

The liver is one of the most important organs of the body and the largest gland. It weighs an average of approximately four pounds. It secretes approximately a quart of fluid necessary for the vital processes of the body every day. It is the great chemical laboratory of the body. It needs great care and attention to keep it in good working order. An animal with its liver removed cannot live more than a few hours.

The liver prevents poisons from reaching the blood stream and organs of the body. It synthesizes the fibrogen necessary for the clotting of blood. It also produces an antithrombin to prevent the clotting of blood within the blood vessels. It stores fats and sugars to be released as needed. The liver is primarily a gland which secretes bile. The bile stimulates other secretions and the worm-like action of the intestines. It checks bacterial action. The bile pigments arises from dead blood cells and impart color to the stools. The bile salts are needed in the digestion of fats.

One of the most common ailments of the liver is congestion. This may be the precursor of more serious ailments, such as hepatitis or inflammation, cirrhosis, fatty degeneration, etc. In many cases of liver trouble, this organ weighs several times its normal weight. The gall bladder has the important function of storing the bile and releasing it when necessary to

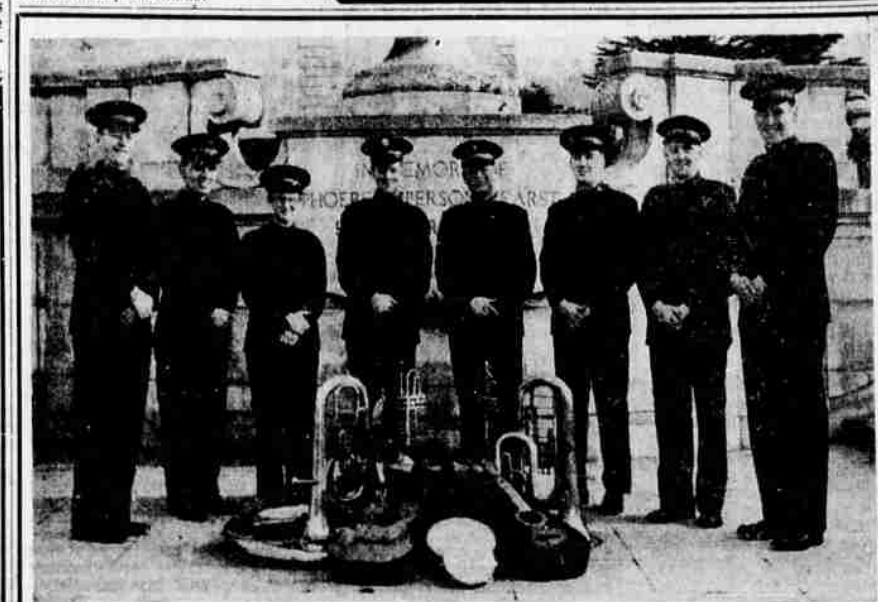
carry on digestion. Functional disturbances of the liver and gall bladder contribute greatly to the common diseases of mankind. Many cases of suffering and distress after a meal and usually blamed on the stomach are really caused by gall bladder trouble. Women are frequent sufferers from it, because of involved cholesterol chemistry. Their menstrual function, and child bearing greatly influence. At the menopause this particular body chemistry undergoes a radical change.

More overweight women suffer from liver and gall bladder trouble than any other group. Eating rich food, tight lacing, a sedentary occupation or a poor nerve supply will cause the bile to become thick and slow moving, at times hardening into gall stones. This process may be slow, insidious and nagging. Sometimes it flares up when a stone passes through the duct leading to the small intestine, this produces a sudden attack of gall bladder colic.
