Sighting a police radio car, Gibson, 30, a Negro, stopped so fast the robber fell off the seat. Gibson leaped from the cab and yelled to police, who arrested Albert Blanchard, 27, of the Bronx. He was charged with assault and robbery.

War Heroism, Top Listing In Examination Fail To Win Oregon Tax Berth For Nisei

Sage was a member of the famous Nisei outfit which, with Japanese boys segregated from other outfits, won heroic honors on the battlefield in World War II. Sage was wounded in France. He spent 18 months in hospitals in Europe and the United States. Cripple-legged, but high in spirit and ambition, Sage went to college under the G. I. Bill of Rights. He graduated with a business administration degree from Lewis and Clark College in Portland in 1950, then took post graduate work in business administration at the University of Oregon, supporting himself and his widowed mother in Hood River on his G. I. pension. Qualified For Job But— He took civil service examinations in Oregon. Later, Sage said, he talked to a personnel director. Careful not to identify the official he said he was told — in plain language — he had the qualifications but that it would be "advisable" for him not to take the job. "I thought, well... I would just go the federal government," he said.

Wood-Chemical Field May Open To Lumbermen

PORTLAND (AP)—A wood-chemical era is in prospect for the Pacific Northwest lumber industry, promising many new payrolls, Hillman Lueddemann said here Thursday. He told stockholders of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association that a whole new industry, based on sawmill leftovers, could be developed in the wood-chemical field. Lueddemann, president of the association, cited hardboard and pulp plants as examples of industries based on sawmill leftovers. James K. Knudson, interstate commerce commissioner and defense transport administrator, told the lumbermen the freight car supply this year probably would be about the same as last year. Lumbermen, especially in Western Oregon, complain annually of an autumn rail car shortage. Knudson said the outlook was for no great improvement. He advised lumbermen to co-operate in their shipping to keep things moving smoothly. He cautioned them against trying to snag cars by putting a "few token sticks of lumber in it at one point, and then move it to another for loading. He said this summed up the entire system. Lueddemann was re-elected president. W. A. Calkin, Vancouver, Wash., was named treasurer. Five vice-presidents were re-elected. New directors elected include: L. G. Olson, Enumclaw, Wash.; Nils Hult, Junction City, Ore.; C. E. Castle, Tillamook, Ore., and B. W. Runkel, Longview, Wash.

DEFENSE MANUAL ISSUED

SALEM (AP)—A civil defense manual for schools has been delivered this week to 13,000 school superintendents and teachers throughout Oregon, State Civil Defense Director Jack A. Hayes said Thursday. The 48-page manual provides patterns for drills and school defense organizations.
