Camas Valley Methodist Church will sponsor an entertainment feature Wednesday, April 2, in the form of several puppet movies. The movies, in which all the actors are puppets, will be shown at the church at 8 o'clock in the evening. A reception for the producers, Mabel and Leslie Beaton of New York, will follow. Mrs. Beaton is the former Mabel Brown of Coos Bay and is the niece of Mrs. Ernest Wheeler and Frank Brown of Camas Valley. The Beatons will be visiting in the Valley.

Mr. and Mrs. Beaton began working with puppets as a hobby and branched into puppet movies to illustrate Bible stories. Their work is sponsored by the Protestant Radio Commission. Mrs. Beaton, a well-known sculptress, makes and manipulates the puppets, and her husband, who is an art director for an advertising agency, designs and builds the sets. Stories already filmed include "The Prodigal Son," "The Good Samaritan," "The Ten Talents," and "The Lost Sheep." Puppet shows of "The Night Before Christmas" and the "Nativity," produced by the Beatons, were purchased by the Telephone Company and shown over television at Christmas time. While primarily intended for TV, the films are available to schools, churches, civic clubs, and community organizations.

The puppets are made in the Beaton home in Rye, N. Y., and the films are "shot" in a small motion picture studio in Larchmont. The figures are constructed of synthetic wood, rubber composition, adhesive, rayon, cellulose and cotton. They are about one-third human size and the sets are designed to that scale.
