

Pin Titles Won By Baughmen In Tournament

Anita Baughman proved why she was a top favorite in this year's City Women's Association bowling tournament Sunday by winning practically every honor in sight at the Roseburg Alleys.

She won the singles championship with a brilliant 619 series. She topped the all-events crown, singles and doubles efforts, by scoring a 1,671 pin total in her And she and her partner Jean Cornutt came in second in doubles competition with a 1,144 pin total. Francis Bistak and Dell Mix combined to take this event with a score of 1,087.

Petite Anita reached her peak in winning the singles diadem. She opened the series with a powerful 207, followed it with a blazing 227, and then fell off to 163 in the third game. A comparable third game, she started with the lowest handicap of the day, a 24.

Blitz Second
Beside her singles series of 619, she rolled a 542 doubles series and a 510 series for the all-events championship. Francis Bistak was second in all-events with a 1,630. Joanne Blakely was the surprise of the tournament as she stole the runner-up singles honors with a 550 series.

In carding the doubles win, Fran Bistak and Dell Mix beat the Baughman-Cornutt team by 43 pins. Mrs. Mix rolled a 508 and her partner scored a 579.

Death Claims Football Coach

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (AP)—Alvin B. (Bo) McMillin, who coached Indiana University to a Big Ten championship and an undefeated season in 1945, died early Monday at his home.

The silver-haired "Mr. Football" whose career as player and coach spanned almost four decades, had been critically ill with a stomach cancer since last fall. But his physician said his death was due to a heart attack.

McMillin was 57.
Early in his coaching career, the prematurely gray Bo had brought to the game a philosophy best summed up by a locker room sign, "You can be as tough as nails and still be a gentleman."

A nationally known figure of the game since as a player he led the Centre College to football fame in 1917-21, McMillin retired from coaching the Philadelphia Eagles of the National Football League last fall. Failing health forced him out.

Pacific Coast Wrestling Title Grabbed By Buck Weaver

Buck Weaver wrestled the Pacific Coast light heavyweight championship belt from Frenchy Roy with a titanic comeback that left the packed house gasping at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night.

Both men used their bag of tricks, but it was Weaver's clever combination of tactics in the final fall that wrapped up the match and dived the Quebec Frenchman of his coveted belt. Weaver had evened up the titanic battle by taking the second of the three falls. Then he outsmarted Frenchy Roy when he looked as if the fine comeback was all in vain. Roy had the upper hand and had Weaver close to pinning when Weaver reached around and patted the champion on the back. Thinking he had won, Roy released his grip. Just the split second Weaver needed. Before the defending champion knew what hit him, he got a back flip and was knocked off his light heavyweight throne by Weaver's pet neckbreaker.

Works Corkscrew
The 185-pound Roy worked his

new corkscrew toehold to perfection in snaring the first fall in 14 minutes. But, Weaver started his uphill return by evening the match eight minutes later with a leg cradle off the ropes.

In the nights opener and semi-final bouts, the two full Nelson-wielding strongmen of the local loop squeezed the breath out of their opponents. Bear-armed George Dusette got his dander up in his match against Cincinnati's Dr. Gallagher. He slammed the Doc against the ropes snagged him as he bounced off and then shook him to pieces with a full Nelson in 12½ minutes.

The semi-final was slated for 30 minutes or three falls. Instead, Eric Pederson's full Nelson cut it to one fall and 13½ minutes. After the heavy-beleoped Pederson applied his favorite destroyer, his opponent, Danno MacDonald couldn't come back for the second fall.

Since the finish of the 1951 season, Rogers Hornsby who pitched the Rainiers to the pennant, has departed to try his luck with the St. Louis Browns. With him went Jim Rivera, the PCL's most valuable player.

Asiatic Partridges Will Be Freed In Oregon

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon Game Commission hopes to raise 10,000 Asiatic Chukar partridges for release in Eastern Oregon next fall.

The Hermiton game farm is being converted to handle 7,000 and the remainder will be raised at the Ontario game farm, the commission said.

In the past two years, the commission has built up a breeding flock of 1200 Chukars. A trial plant of 270 Chukars was made in the Warner Valley near Lakeview last October and survived one of the severest winters on record for the area, Norman Minnick, game agent, said.

The birds have been planted successfully in rough, arid regions of Washington and Nevada.

National Outlay Drop Depends On Korean War

WASHINGTON (AP)—If there is no stepped up fighting in Korea and no general war in the next year, says Secretary of Defense Lovett, the U.S. will spend 167 million dollars a day for military security until 1954.

After that expenditures can begin to taper off, he told Congress. But if military action increases the cost will go still higher.

Jimmy Clark Snared Top Money In Golf Meet

WILMINGTON, N.C. (AP)—Jimmy Clark of Laguna Beach, Calif., slashed 16 strokes off par Sunday to take top money of \$2,000 in the Azalea Open Golf Tournament. It was his first major tournament victory.

His 66-71-67-68 performance over the 6,852-yard, par 72 Cape Fear Country Club course was four strokes better than the tournament record of 216 set three years ago by Henry Ramsom.

Second at 275, three strokes away, were George Fazio, Pine Valley, N.J., and Jimmy Turnesa, Briarcliff, N.Y. Fazio had a fine 69 after earlier rounds of 70-66-70, while Turnesa showed rounds of 67-69-69-70. Each received \$1,200.

Time Extension Urged For West Coast Car Pay

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Federal Reserve Board was asked Monday to give West Coast residents an extra three months to pay for their automobiles.

Rep. Mack (R-Wash.), made public a letter to the board in which he said present credit regulations—one third down and 18 months to pay—adds from \$12 to \$20 a month to payments of West coast residents over those of purchasers further east who do not have to pay the high freight costs.

The result, Mack wrote, is that new car sales have fallen off in Oregon, Washington and California far faster than elsewhere in the country.

He proposed that the board give the westerners 21 months in these states to pay off.

French Assembly Okays Japanese Peace Treaty

PARIS (AP)—The French National Assembly ratified the Japanese Treaty Friday by a vote of 399 to 101.

The French action virtually made the peace treaty effective since it now has been approved by seven of the signatories whose ratification was required by the treaty's terms.

The treaty previously had been approved by the United States, Japan, Great Britain, Australia, New Zealand and Ceylon.

Child At Play Burns To Death In Dog House

VAN NUYS, Calif. (AP)—A dog house caught fire Friday and burned a 4-year-old James Cousins to death while his mother looked on unaware of his presence.

The child had gone into his back yard to play after finishing his afternoon nap, said his mother, Mrs. F. H. Cousins. The body was discovered by firemen.

The Roseburg track team will get a chance to concentrate its power today at 3:30 on Finlay field in the first dual meet of the year.

Judging from performances in the double triumph posted by a split Indian squad Friday night, it has considerable power to concentrate. Today, the visiting Cottage Grove trackmen will test that early budding power.

Coaches Frank Purdy and Ed Wyatt were both visibly pleased with the showing of the Roseburg track and field entries Friday.

They pointed out that several of the boys such as Dale Johnson and Ralph Rudzik lived up to advance notice and several others revealed unnoticed talents.

Most of all, Purdy was pleased with what he called "team spirit." "More than anything else, I liked the spirit of the squad," he beamed. "The boys looked, acted and worked like a team."

To prove the point, he pointed out the performance of Art McGhehey in the 800-yard relay against Sutherland. "McGhehey knew we had to win that one to win the meet with Sutherland. He beat out several times on the first leg, but the chips were down and McGhehey beat him."

He went on to state that in this event and in every other, team members were giving every measure of moral support.

Apparently two men to watch in this meet and others which unfold the season are Rudzik and Larry Fitzgerald. Both put up magnificent initial shows Friday. Their efforts were enhanced considerably by the early stage of the season. Fitzgerald broke the school record by 11 seconds in the 100-yard dash. Rudzik's javelin throw of 158 feet was almost mid-season caliber.

The two weakest events are apparently the broad and high jumps. "We'll just have to work harder on these," Purdy said.

Cougar Skiers Gather Honors

SKYKOMISH, Wash. (AP)—Washington State skiers scored 36½ points out of a possible 400 Sunday to win the seventh annual Pacific Northwest Interscholastic Ski Association championships.

The University of Washington team was second with 378½ points, and Seattle University No. 1 team finished third with 344.9. Behind them were Whitman, 337.5; Montana, 334.2; and Idaho 326.8.

Points were not computed for the University of Alaska, College of Puget Sound, Wenatchee Junior College and Seattle U. No. 2 team because not enough men were entered.

In compiling its total, Washington State took the cross country and finished second in the slalom Saturday, and won team jumping and was second in the downhill Sunday.

The four-way combined title was won by WSC's Allan Fisher who collected 363.5 points. Guttom Berge of Whitman was first across the finish line in the downhill in 1:12.4 and Ola Gjestrud, Wenatchee, won the individual jumping crown with 226.9 points.

Central Oregon To Get More Electric Service

PRINEVILLE (AP)—Electrical service may be extended to more farmers in Central Oregon in the coming year.

Wallace Bird, secretary of an AFL-Carpenters Union, said he had received word that funds for the extension have been placed in the federal budget.

He said Senator Cordon R-Ore.) sent word that the Budget Bureau had agreed to give \$250,000 to the Bonneville Power Administration for a Redmond substation.

The substation would make power available to a rural electrification district that already has been granted \$500,000 to extend power service in the Lapine, Gilchrist, Chemult, Silver Lake and Fort Rock area, he said.

The AFL union has been backing the project.

McMinnville Votes Sewage Project Bonds

McMINNVILLE (AP)—Only 500 of the city's 3,400 registered voters turned out here Friday but they approved a \$300,000 bond issue to build a sewage treatment plant.

Along with the issuance of bonds they approved a water users tax of not more than \$1 a month to pay interest on the bonds and maintenance on the plant.

Work is expected to start this summer. It will be Yamhill county's second treatment plant, Newberg having the only one at present. The state sanitary authority has been pressing other communities for action and other elections are contemplated.

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Shooters Fire Perfect Rounds For Journal

After faltering slightly last weekend in Oregon Journal Telegraph Trapshooting competition, scorers from the Roseburg Rod and Gun Club came back with new verve to post four perfect 25s Sunday.

Only the top three scorers count on the weekly score board. Thus, the local shotgun men not only assured the highest possible 75, but added a fourth perfect 25 for insurance. This gave the shooters at the Winchester Traps a team performance that can't be bettered, but may be tied. Last week, Roseburg's team scored a 74 to drop its first man out of the season. **Serie Explained**

To briefly explain the method of scoring, the telegraphic score from Roseburg is compared with the records of four other teams around the state which are chosen beforehand. For every win, two points are scored; for every tie, one point is notched, and no points are credited for a loss. Roseburg, at present is in second place among the state's shooters just two points behind St. Johns of Portland.

As Plummer put it, "It would be a pity to see the Chiefs go under when all they need is a more popular base of support which fans and sponsors can fulfill."

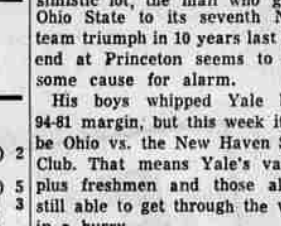
Ohio State Swimmers Win Championship
