Flower Petal Rolls

Softens 2 cakes yeast in 1/4 cup lukewarm water. Scald 1 cup milk. Add 1/4 cup shortening, 1/2 cup sugar and 1 tsp. salt. Cool to lukewarm. Add 3 cups sifted Kitchen Craft Flour to make thick batter. Add yeast, 3 beaten eggs and 3 tsp. lemon rind. Beat well. Add about 2 more cups sifted Kitchen Craft Flour to make a soft dough. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead until satiny.

Place in greased bowl, cover and let rise in a warm place till doubled in bulk. When light, punch down. Roll out part of dough on a lightly floured surface, to 1/4" thickness. Cover lightly with waxed paper; allow to rest 15 minutes. Cut into 2" squares. Overlap four of these around each well-greased muffin cup, points extending above top.

Shape 1" balls from remaining dough and place one in center of each cup. Top with piece of cooked fruit (peaches, apricots or prunes). Let rise till double in bulk. Bake in a moderate oven (375°F.) about 20 minutes. Brush with melted butter and sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon. Yield: about 2 doz. medium rolls.

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
