## Washington

**WASHINGTON** — Elated friends of Sens. Taft and Kefauver talked of them Thursday as victory bound candidates in the presidential nomination races, but opposition camps sounded counterclaims.  
 Backers of Taft of Ohio for top place on the Republican ticket and supporters of Kefauver of Tennessee for the Democratic nomination based their optimism on the outcome of Tuesday's primaries in Nebraska and Wisconsin.  
 "Taft's success in both contests represents a definite upsurge of strength and puts him, I believe, on the way to victory," said Sen. Schoepel (R-Kan.).  
 Sen. Morse (R-Ore.), said Nebraska and Wisconsin amounted to "gains for Taft," but added he has "no doubt" the GOP nomination will go to Gen. Eisenhower.

Wisconsin victories as sure signs their candidates were headed for presidential nominations. But supporters of those who didn't do so well belittled such claims.  
 Taft won 24 of the 30 Wisconsin delegates, with Gov. Warren of California getting the other six. Kefauver won all 28 Democratic delegates.  
 Eisenhower was not on the ballot and write-ins were not permitted.  
 Other political developments:  
 1. Tennessee's GOP convention in Nashville Wednesday named four more Taft delegates to the party's national convention, giving the Ohioan 19 of the 20 from that state. The 20th delegate will be named May 2.  
 2. The Maryland Court of Appeals — the state's highest tribunal — agreed to rule next Tuesday on whether the way will be opened for write-in votes in the May 5 primary. The ruling will be on an order by State Circuit Judge Emory H. Niles which would compel election supervisors to provide space for write-in votes.  
 3. A national poll of country weekly newspaper editors by the American Press, a trade magazine, showed 253 favored Taft as their "personal choice." Eisenhower 243, Kefauver 30. Other candidates had less support.  
 4. Norman Thomas, one-time perennial Socialist candidate for president, said in Garden City, N. Y., he will support his own party but he "likes Ike" and thinks his chances of election "look very good."

## Detroit Pitcher's Baby Killed In Auto Crash

**CLEVELAND, Tenn.** — Pitcher Art Houtteman's seven-month-old daughter, Cheryl, was killed and his wife and mother injured Thursday morning in an auto accident near here as the Detroit Tiger's family was returning home from Florida.  
 The accident occurred on U.S. 41 near Gen. Eisenhower. Rep. Priest (D-Tenn.), called Kefauver's victories in the two primaries "proof that the rank and file of the Democrats are going to insist that he be nominated."  
 On the other hand, Sen. Maybank (D-S.C.), contended that Sen. Russell of Georgia "has the edge at this point" for the nod on the Democratic ticket. Maybank said Russell has "the Solid South sewed up and he is going to have enough northern delegates to make it a race."

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benefits which were recommended by the Wage Stabilization Board. The steel industry said they would have to get government permission to raise prices in order to grant the pay boost. But the government is against hiking steel prices.  
 Some senators expressed doubt the government had legal authority to take over the industry. Company lawyers reportedly were preparing to fight any government seizure action.  
 The company and union planned to resume their long-delayed negotiations in New York. However, there was no indication of a break from either side.

**PORTLAND** — Portland's Western Union supervisors worked all night and by morning Manager W. H. War said the backlog of messages had been cleaned up and plans were afoot for starting limited service to the public.  
 Automatic switching equipment is handling cables, he said, and supervisory personnel — 20 or 30 workers — will handle government and defense plant telegrams.  
 He said the mail office, locked when the workers went out on strike, would be re-opened Thursday but service would be on a highly restricted basis.  
 The union headquarters reported 100 per cent of the non-supervisory personnel on strike. This includes messengers. The number on strike is 330 to 340 in Portland with another 200 or more in the rest of the state, the union office reported.  
 Pickets were at the main office at S. W. Broadway and Oak, but were not to be placed at other offices so long as no attempt was made to open them.

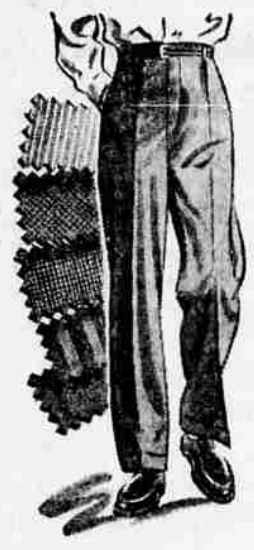
