

TUNA EXPORTS UOYA

TOKYO (AP) — The Japanese government Saturday set up a quota system for tuna exports. During the next 12 months Japan will export 12,000 tons of frozen tuna and 1,000,000 cases of canned tuna. The Ministry of International Trade and Industry plans to ask the U. S. Congress not to vote import duties on tuna.

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U.N. Inspection Of U.S. Atomic Sites Offered

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — The United States offered Saturday to allow UN inspectors to check the location and size of all atomic energy installations as the first step in a world census on armaments.

Benjamin Cohen, U.S. alternate delegate, proposed a working plan to a UN Disarmament Commission subcommittee taking up the study of census and verification of all armed forces and weapons, including atomic.

The U. S. has insisted that census and verification must be the first step in any balanced reduction of armaments. Jacob Malik, Soviet delegate, insists that prohibition of the atomic bomb must be the first step and has attacked the U. S. census plan as only a move to provide spying data for British and American intelligence.

A U. S. delegation spokesman said the new U. S. plan marks a change in the old atomic control plan drawn up by Bernard Baruch by proposing some measure of atomic inspection during the first stage instead of in later stages. Cohen proposed five stages for the census plan, the first beginning with governments reporting their own installations for producing atomic energy and the size of their armed forces and armaments.

Inspectors would be permitted aerial survey, checking power input, and water, railway and power lines—to make a direct check on the location, manpower used and size of atomic installations. But they would not be permitted inside the plants at this stage.

Atom weapon stockpiles would not be counted in the proposed first stage.

MUSIC YOU WANT with pleasure welcomes the distinguished American contralto, Marian Anderson, singing spirituals tonight at 8:00. As many commentators have pointed out, the Negro spiritual is one of the few direct contributions America has made to music. Its rise in the mid-nineteenth century was stimulated by a member of factors, the tour of the Fisk Jubilee Singers in 1871 being one that served to popularize the art. The songs of Stephen Foster, which were akin to the spirit of the spirituals, and Dvorak's "New World Symphony" also brought to public attention the greatness of native music which until then, had been taken for granted. These factors, however, were merely the popularizing ones that broadened the audience for the spiritual; its true sources stem from motions experienced by the Negro under emotional experiences were expressed in a variety of forms from work songs and simple assertions of faith, to commentaries on the instability of life and the immutability of Divine Providence. In their plaintive simplicity and rich harmony, the Negro spirituals are a well spring of human emotion, as varied as humanity itself.

Bills On Bankruptcy Approved By Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) — Three bills dealing with bankruptcies were passed by the Senate Friday and sent to the House. Sen. Magnuson (D-Wash.) was floor manager for the measures. One, a successor to the old Frazier-Lemke Law enacted in the 30's to give relief to depression-hit farmers, would write into permanent law a bankruptcy procedure for farmer debtors. The second would make more than 100 changes of "technical nature" in the bankruptcy code to bring it up to date. The third authorizes a pay raise for referees in bankruptcies, increasing the maximum salary for full-time referees from \$10,000 to \$12,500 a year and for part-time referees from \$5,000 and \$6,000.

House Committee Slashes More Than \$4 Billion Off Proposed Defense Budget

WASHINGTON (AP) — A \$4,240,638,500 cut in the Defense Department's budget for the fiscal year starting July 1 was recommended by the House Appropriations Committee Thursday.

The \$46,680,384,270 the committee approved won't be enough if actual war starts, and will be far too much if peace comes suddenly, Rep. Mahon (D-Tex.), chairman of the group that prepared the budget, told newsmen.

Demands for stiffer cuts are expected to be made in the House when the bill is debated next week. Nothing was cut from the overall budget of \$1,700,000,000 for search and development to produce the latest-type weapons.

Here's how the services would share the money recommended: Army — \$12,520,000,000, a cut of \$1,680,000,000. Navy — \$12,915,918,000 a cut of \$1,680,000,000. Air Force — \$20,928,178,770, a cut of \$1,066,384,000.

Office of the secretary including retirement pay for military personnel—\$414,562,500, a cut of \$51,702,000. Board — \$1,500,000, a cut of \$250,000. National Security Resources — \$300,000, a cut of \$36,000. National Security Training Commission — \$75,000, a cut of \$36,000.

The total is \$10,076,174,152 less than Congress appropriated for the current fiscal year for the armed forces. The committee voted against funds for a second "Forrestal" class plane carrier which the Navy had given top priority and wanted to start building immediately at an estimated cost of 210 million dollars.

The "Forrestal," a 60,000-ton ship, is under construction now and funds to complete it have been appropriated. Mahon told newsmen the subcommittee is not necessarily opposed to building another super-carrier but deferred construction because it would take five years to complete the job.

Mahon also claimed a cut of 560 million dollars in the Navy's air budget and \$1,502,200,000 in the Air Force budget would not retard the plane procurement program, deliveries from which now are being financed from money previously appropriated.

The Air Force, he said, wanted to order 7,500 more planes and the Navy 2,700 more for future delivery. "The services cannot wisely obligate more money than we are giving them," Mahon said. "If actual war should start during the coming year, the money provided would not be enough. But if there is an unexpected easing in the present tense situation, we have granted far too much."

In the latter event, Mahon said, it would be up to Congress to recapture many of the billions now and to become available to the armed forces. On June 30 of this year, Mahon said, the Defense Department will have on hand about \$7 billion dollars in cash from previous appropriations, with the same amount estimated to be carried over on June 30, 1953.

The reason for the large carry-overs is that Congress in recent years has been putting up cash for the defense program instead of financing the bulk of it through contract authorizations as in former years. A contract authorization is a sort of promissory note arrangement, with payments being made when the products are delivered.

Entries Listed For Primaries In California

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Saturday in California, the Presidential primary sweepstakes next June 3 had these final entries: Republican — Gov. Earl Warren, Minnesota's Harold E. Stassen, and a "free choice" slate headed by Rep. Wedel. Democratic — Tennessee's Sen. Kefauver and a "free choice" slate headed by state's Attorney General Edmund G. (Pat) Brown.

The filing time expired Friday night with Brown just getting in—after his workers rounded up an estimated 11,000 names in a 48-hour whirlwind drive. Even at that he may be challenged. The Northern California campaign committee for Kefauver has said it would challenge the legality of Brown's ticket on grounds it has only 72 delegates when there should be 76.

Brown, who has emphasized he is not a presidential aspirant but wants a California slate with a free choice as opposed to one pledged to Kefauver, stepped into the race when President Truman stepped out. Four Switch Support

Four of the Truman delegates, including Jimmy Roosevelt, withdrew from that slate. There were reports that some or all of the four favor Kefauver. That cut the slate to 72.

But Brown says the Kefauver group is bringing up "hyper-technical" objections which can't stand up in court. On the Republican side, Governor Warren has the pledged support of most of the state GOP leaders. The last of 30,000 names in support of a Warren slate was filed Friday night in Los Angeles.

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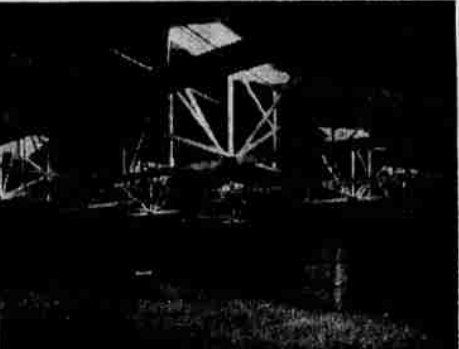
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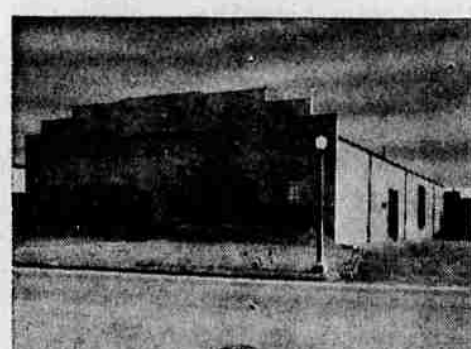
