The United States Clothing Manufacturers Association announced Sunday the union has agreed to extend currently expiring contracts until Sept. 15.

Fullerton School Teacher Discusses Child Education

"Not all children are ready to read at the same time, for they do not mature at the same degree", Mrs. Edna Matthews, first grade teacher at Fullerton School told the study group conducted for parents of pre-school children, under the auspices of the Parent-Teacher association.

Mrs. Matthews pointed out definite things that parents might do at home to prepare their child for school. These included teaching the child to go to the lavatory alone, to put on outdoor wraps, to cross streets, to be reliable, to play with other children and learn to share and to follow simple directions. Mrs. Matthews pointed out that the life of a first grade teacher could become complicated if she had to help put on 32 pair of galoshes of various degrees of tightness in the last five minutes before the school bus departed.

A safeguard for not going too far in getting a child ready for school work is considered merely to answer his questions, she said because the youngster will ask if he is ready to learn a particular thing. This is true in regard to the alphabet, and to numbers. Here the discussion brought out the fact that it was all right to teach him to count, but don't lead him on. It is well for him to learn colors, the use of crayons and how to handle scissors. It was also indicated that a child is fortunate who has had many poems, stories and nursery rhymes read to him before he starts to school.

The speaker said parents should not attempt to teach pre-school children to read or write, at least not anything more than their own name. Let them learn to count aloud if they wish, but do not have them write the numbers. These things are best taught by the teachers in the school.

Mrs. Matthews suggested certain things which help the teacher and child. Send the child to school regularly. Keep him home if he has a contagious disease. Send a note to school with him explaining the reason for such absence. Send a note to the teacher if anything unusual has occurred in the family which might upset the child. Give him a good breakfast every morning. See that he gets plenty of rest. Try to send him to school reasonably clean.

The sister, Angella, 13, was shot as she was combing her hair. The bullet which police said was apparently fired from a gun that Gerald was examining, shattered a mirror the girl was holding and entered her body just above the heart.

Police said he did not know that his sister was dead. They did not tell him immediately.
