

Jones Sparks Phillies To Victory

"Sock a ballplayer where it hurts most — in the pocket book, — to make him toe the line," is an oft-proved adage.

Willie (Puddin' Head) Jones, the fine third baseman of the Philadelphia Phillies, is the latest example that there's plenty of truth in the old saying.

Jones was fined \$200 by Manager Eddie Sawyer on March 17 for breaking training rules. Since then, Willie has been a ball of fire both on and off the field.

He started, again Monday as the Phil made it four straight over the St. Louis Cardinals with a 5-4 triumph at Raleigh, N.C. Willie homered in the eighth to launch a three-run rally that won the game.

Home runs also were plentiful at High Point, N.C., where the Philadelphia Athletics outlasted the Boston Red Sox, 12-6. Eight homers were hit with Joe Astroth, Gus Zernial and Alie Clark connecting for the A's and Dom DiMaggio, Vern Stephens, Billy Goodman, Jim Piersall and Faye Thronberry for the Sox.

The Brooklyn Dodgers, who lost a 1-0 no-hitter to the Braves Sunday, pounded out 11 hits to swamp the Boston Braves, 8-4, at Lynchburg, Va.

Rookie Bill Miller and Veteran Joe Ostrowski almost turned in the spring's fourth no-hit, no-run game. The left-handers pitched the New York Yankees to a 8-0, one-hit victory over the Columbus Cardinals of the Class "A" South Atlantic League at Columbus, Ga. Bill Harris singled in the sixth to spoil the bid.

Dick Wakefield Gets Chance With Giants
HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — The Dick Wakefield story enters a new chapter, Tuesday, perhaps the last. Wakefield, baseball's so-called "problem child," has received another opportunity to prove he belongs in the major leagues.

The New York Giants, in dire straits due to the loss of outfielder Monte Irvin with a broken ankle and the impending induction of flycatcher Willie Mays, will give Wakefield a "try out."

Manager Leo Durocher said Wakefield "will play in the outfield someplace. I don't know, I just want to look him over and see what he's got."

Al Lopez, manager of the Cleveland Indians said: "He can help the Giants, if he really wants to play."

Chicago's Cubs came up with seven runs in the fourth and defeated the St. Louis Browns, 8-6, at Shreveport, La. Ned Garver, the Brown's 20-game winner, was the victim of the big blast.

The Washington Senators edged the Cincinnati Reds, 8-7, at Roanoke, Va., thanks to Rookie Pitcher Raoul Sanchez. Sanchez took over in the ninth with none out, two runs in and two on, and retired the side.

In night games, the Chicago White Sox nosed out the Pittsburgh Pirates, 4-3, at New Orleans and the Detroit Tigers nipped Atlanta of the Southern Association, 10-9, in ten innings at Atlanta.

Canyonville Thinclads Show

A full report from Ronald Kraskey, Canyonville mentor of the Tiger track team reveals his team made an outstanding showing at the Willamette Relays Saturday for a "B" school.

As formerly mentioned, Bill Hoffee was the Canyonville standout. He ran a 10.5 second 100 and ran anchor on the winning 440-yard relay. Hoffee's dash performance was the second best of the day and tied the record set at the relays last week.

The Tigers' 440-yard relay was the top performance among all the "B" schools in that event. They ran third in the 880-yard heat. Bad luck overtook Vernon Wheeler, who appeared destined to walk off with a blue ribbon. Going to the lead in the high hurdles, Wheeler was leading the pack when he tangled with the fifth hurdle and toppled out of the race.

Simmons Discharged, Will Rejoin Phillies

NEW BRUNSWICK, N.J. (AP) — Sgt. Curt Simmons starts down the Army's muster — out production line Tuesday with his interrupted baseball career waiting at the other end.

The 22-year-old southpaw ace will rejoin the Philadelphia Phillies as soon as he can complete his Army discharge and come to contract terms with Philadelphia Owner Bob Carpenter.

Simmons flew back to the U.S. Monday from Germany, where he had been serving with the 28th Infantry Division.

His first move as an ex-serviceman will be to hold a contract conference with Carpenter.

The best guess seemed to be that Simmons would get the figure he was drawing when he went into the Army — somewhere around \$15,000 — possibly with a bonus clause if he shows the same sort of stuff he had when last on public display.

Harlem Globetrotters Nip College All-Stars

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The largest crowd in local basketball history — 8,841 spectators — jammed Civic Auditorium Monday night to watch the Harlem Globetrotters beat the 1952 College All-Americans, 67-62.

The win gave the Globetrotters an 8-2 advantage in their "World Series of Basketball."

The collegians, employing a fast break offense, established a first quarter 15-12 lead and ended on top at the half 33-32.

Set shot Artist Clarence Wilson hit a hot streak in the second half and sparked the Trotters to a 55-43 lead at the start of the final period.

Reece "Goose" Tatum wound up the night with 26 points, while Notre Dame's LeRoy Leslie topped the collegians with 13.

Athletic Violators To Get Attention

CHICAGO (AP) — The National Collegiate Athletic Association has stepped up its efforts to crack down on violators of its academic and athletic requirements.

A four-man committee, headed by NCAA Executive Director Walter Byers, was named Monday at the final session of the NCAA convention to handle complaints and investigate evidence of violations.

The other members are John Hurlbert, Stanford; King Hendricks, Utah State; and Tom Hamilton, Pittsburgh.

The four can act only in advisory capacity, channeling reports to a new enforcement group to be made up of nine educators of the NCAA membership.

The 17-man council, the powerful policy-making body, will have final authority to determine whether a member school should be suspended or otherwise punished for code violation.

The council also clarified the new NCAA's limit of 20 spring football practices in a 30 day period.

NCAA President Hugh Whitely of Southern California said that "Any activity on field or floor, movie demonstration, or chalk talk, or combination of the three, on a given day will constitute one session of the 20 sessions permitted."

East-West Quintets Meet In Shrine Tilt

KANSAS CITY (AP) — Twenty of the nation's top ranking cage stars will participate in the first annual East-West basketball game sponsored by the Ararat Shrine Temple here Saturday night.

All net proceeds will go to Shriner hospitals for crippled children.

Phog Allen, coach of the NCAA Champion Kansas Jayhawks, will coach the West team. Henry (Hank) Iba, of Oklahoma A. I. M., will tutor the East team.

Topping the list of name players is Clyde Lovellette, Kansas All-America scoring giant.

The West squad also includes Dick Haag, Wyoming; Jim Hamstead, Stanford; Jerry Romney, Brigham Young; and Glenn Smith, Utah.

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Riddle Irish Lose Contest To Oakland

The Riddle Irish blew a six-run lead at Oakland Saturday to drop their second game of the season, 9-6.

The Irish capitalized on four Oakland errors in the first brace of innings to collect that six-run bulge. But the Oaks clipped two-thirds off that margin in the fourth by grouping three singles with three Riddle errors. Two more errors and another brace of singles gave the Oaks the count, 7-6, in the last of the fifth.

The Oaks wrapped up the game in the sixth. Dick Mann walked three batters with two men down. An infield grounder was bobbled at third and the final duo of runs came in.

Some of the obvious flaws on the Riddle team have been overlooked, however, since the Irish have only three players with any experience at all. Coach John W. George of Riddle credited the loss to "faulty fielding" (9 errors) and poor hitting (2 hits). But he states, "We will improve. Our inexperienced infield executed a perfect double play, which shows some promise."

George gave special laurels to Freshman Pitcher Bill Edwards, who hurled the first 4-1-3 innings, and Gary Garren, who caught his first baseball game, "and did a superb job behind the plate."

Detention Camp Plan Opposed By Ministers

PORTLAND (AP) — The section of the McCarran Act which provides for the establishment of concentration camps in the U. S., is being opposed by three Portland ministers.

The Rt. Rev. Benjamin D. Dagwell, Oregon Episcopal bishop; Dr. Gerald R. Kennedy, Methodist bishop, and Rabbi Julius J. Nodel, in a letter to President Truman Friday, called for "direct abandonment of the detention camp program."

Damage Suits Follow Two Traffic Accidents

Douglas County was named defendant in a Circuit Court suit in which it alleged that grading a road weakened the roots of a tree which toppled over on a truck.

N. W. Staley, owner of the truck, asks damages totaling \$1,298.90. His complaint says the tree fell on his truck as an employee was driving it over a road in the Little River Canyon east of Glendale.

Damages of \$50,000 general and \$527 special are asked of the Nybert Lumber Co. and R. L. Cyrus in a suit filed by William H. F. Ziedrich.

Ziedrich alleges a log truck was parked partially on the pavement of Highway 42 and that the pickup truck he was driving struck the left rear wheel of the truck and was thrown into the opposite lane of traffic, colliding with an oncoming vehicle.

The other car was driven by Robert Brooks. Ziedrich says the accident occurred Oct. 19, 1950, the complaint says, and serious and permanent injuries are claimed.

A municipal court complaint against Barbara Louise Doughton, Roseburg, charged with failing to leave name and address at the scene of an accident, was dismissed and her case was referred to district court.
