Eddie Chandler, whose two shut-outs against Sacramento make him the Pacific Coast League's hottest hurler, takes the mound Thursday night favored to lead the Los Angeles Angels to their ninth win in 10 starts.

The 100-pound right hander will be dueling with Southpaw Dick Pettit, the \$100,000 bonus baby Hollywood acquired from Pittsburgh.

The league-leading Angels made it five straight Wednesday night, nipping Hollywood 6-5 by squelching a last ditch rally. The Stars changed a ho-hum affair into a humdinger by scoring three runs in the ninth inning. Then, with the bases loaded and two down, Chuck Stevens fanned out to miss a chance for glory.

Seattle Edged
At San Diego the surprising Padres hung onto second place in the standings by edging Seattle 6-5. The Rainiers came from behind to tie it up at 4-4 with four runs in the eighth. But in the ninth Seattle's Artie Wilson led off with a single, moved to second on an error and scored on a sacrifice and an outfield fly. Then Dick Faber hit a 375-foot homer for the winning margin.

Faber is a rookie up from Salem in the Western International League. Sacramento snapped a 4-game losing streak in downing Portland 4-3. Two runs in the seventh inning put the Solons ahead. Pinch-hitter Johnny Ostrowski doubled to left, went to third on an infield error and scored on a blow by Mike McCormick that bounced off Pitcher Red Lynn's glove. McCormick scored on a triple by Bill Glynn.

A thunderstorm washed out the San Francisco-Oakland game.

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Jake LaMotta Scores Decision Over Hayes

DETROIT (AP) — Jake LaMotta's comeback express still thunders along. The 30-year-old former middleweight champion battered his former conqueror, Norman Hayes, in a 10-round slugfest Wednesday night to grab a unanimous decision.

Jake weighed 167½ and Hayes 162. LaMotta was in trouble only in the early rounds of this battle. Hayes, 21-year-old Bostonian, hit him 10 times in 12 years as a professional and blasted to the body in the first, second and fourth rounds.

But Jake, looking far sharper than in his loss to Hayes in Boston Jan. 28 and his draw with Eugene Halstrom March 5, rocked his foe in the last five rounds.

Sutherland Nips Oakland, 14-8

BOSTON (AP) — New York's delegation gained both team and top individual honors while providing two 1952 champions during the three nights of National AAU boxing competition at the Boston Garden.

After a total of 128 bouts, in which 138 boxers from 20 sectional associations battled, Floyd Patterson, an 18-year-old New York schoolboy, was voted the tournament's outstanding competitor while winning the 165-pounds title. The New York Team drew the high total of 19 points.

The California winners were Heavyweight Jack Scheberies of Oakland, who defeated Alex Brown of Philadelphia in their final engagement, and Mac Martinez of San Jose, who out-slugged Edson Brown of New York, for the 125-pounds diadem.

The strong Southwestern Oregon semi-pro baseball league must find another member. Reedsport has officially dropped from the loop.

The Reedsport withdrawal was made known at a league meeting at Coquille Sunday and it opened the door for another team to enter the Sawdust loop.

When Myrtle Creek dropped from the League earlier this spring, Eugene was courted to fill in the strongest semi-pro loop in the state.

Instead, Drain was chosen to complete the eight-team roster. Now, the Eugenians may be offered another chance. According to Dick Jewett, Medford Mail Tribune Sports Editor, Klamath Falls has second option. Nothing definite has been revealed yet, however.

If either of these teams comes into the league, it will mean another night baseball town. Only Brookings does not have night facilities.

Reedsport also was without lights. Since Drain was chosen over Eugene after Myrtle Creek dropped out, it stands to reason that Eugene would be chosen over Klamath Falls. The reason stated for the Drain choice was that the traveling distances between League teams were less. Present teams in the League are Roseburg, Medford, Coos Bay-North Bend, Drain, Coquille, Brookings and Bandon.

Tri-City Dump Ground Discussed

Possibility of establishing a public garbage dump ground to serve the entire Tri-City area was discussed Tuesday night by the Myrtle Creek City Council.

The council, in talking over the matter with County Sanitarian T. Claude Baker, said it's willing to re-open discussion with Canyonville, Riddle and county officials in an effort to establish the dump grounds.

During 1950 and 1951 the three cities and the county attempted to agree on public garbage dump in the Tri-City area which would be open to both the general public and private garbage collectors.

Since it was difficult to reach a satisfactory agreement the plan was tabled for future consideration, Baker said.
