New Affliction Hits Child After Surgery Ordeal

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — Tragedy has struck again in the life of Minnie Rose Webb, the crippled girl who daily cheered trainmen passing the Webb tenant farm near Covington, Tenn.

Minnie Rose, now 19, is in John Gaston Hospital here, a victim of meningitis. A charity patient, "She is very sick," her physician said Monday.

The spunky girl, at the age of nine, failed to recover from crippling effects of an appendectomy. The operation left her lower limbs paralyzed.

Despite her handicap, Minnie Rose would sit in a chair on her front porch and wave cheerfully to crews of Illinois Central trains that chugged past the three-room farm house.

Curious as to why the little girl never romped and played like other children, the trainmen investigated one day in 1945.

That started a landslide of assistance to Minnie Rose. Trainmen bought her a wheelchair and other gifts and later sent her to a St. Louis crippled children's hospital. After a period of treatment, she was able to walk on crutches.

Minnie Rose became ill Saturday while playing marbles with a brother. She has been unconscious ever since.
