New Altrusa Club Is Organized In Roseburg

Mrs. Verne Forsman, field representative for Altrusa International, announces the organization of a club for Roseburg Friday evening, April 25, at Turn Around Inn at a 6:30 p.m. dinner.

Altrusa, the oldest of women's classified service clubs, was organized in Nashville, Tenn., April 11, 1917. In August, 1917, Altrusa Inc. became the first national organization of women's clubs, either classified or unclassified.

Membership in Altrusa is exclusively for one outstanding representative of each particular business or profession, or women working in an executive capacity within the territory of an Altrusa Club. Membership is by invitation only.

In the international organization, there are over 10,000 distinguished professional and executive women in more than 25 clubs throughout the United States, Canada, Mexico, Puerto Rico, Central America, Bermuda, England and Asia who work together to carry out Altrusa's program of service, to foster community, state, national and international betterment.

Like men's service clubs, Altrusa always selects some worthwhile project in the community. They are interested in youth guidance, career conferences, job clinics for teen-agers, scholarships for college students, as well as public affairs and international relationships. Through these broader interests, fine friendships are achieved.

One of the beneficiaries of Altrusa's International projects is Miss Inez Posse Escot, a Latin American young woman who is attending the University of Oregon at Eugene now.

A national fund maintained by Altrusa Clubs is a concerted effort to promote understanding and friendship between the Americas by aiding qualified Latin American students who wish to study or travel in the U. S. to increase their proficiency in their chosen work in their own country.

Clubs have recently been organized in Albany and Springfield. Portland, Salem and Pendleton also have clubs. Washington State boasts of 25 such organizations.
