## THE EASTER MESSAGE

### St. Matt. 28: 1-7

In the end of the Sabbath, as it began to dawn toward the first day of the week, came Mary Magdalene and the other Mary to see the sepulchre.

And, behold, there was a great earthquake: for the angel of the Lord descended from heaven, and came and rolled back the stone from the door, and sat upon it.

His countenance was like lightning, and his raiment white as snow:

And for fear of him the keepers did shake and became as dead men.

And the angel answered and said unto the women, "Fear not ye: for I know that ye seek Jesus which was crucified."

He is not here: for He is risen, as He said. Come, see the place where the Lord lay.

"And go quickly, and tell His disciples that He is risen from the dead; and, behold, He goeth before you into Galilee; there shall ye see Him: Lo, I have told you."

### St. Mark 16: 1-8

And when the Sabbath was past, Mary Magdalene, and Mary, the mother of James, and Salome, had bought sweet spices, that they might come and anoint him.

And very early in the morning the first day of the week, they came unto the sepulchre at the rising of the sun.

And they said among themselves, "Who shall roll us away the stone from the door of the sepulchre?"

And when they looked, they saw that the stone was rolled away: for it was very great.

And entering into the sepulchre, they saw a young man sitting on the right side, clothed in a long white garment; and they were affrighted.

And he said unto them, "Be not affrighted: Ye seek Jesus of Nazareth, which was crucified; he is risen; he is not here; behold the place where they laid him."

"But go your way, tell His disciples and Peter that He goeth before you into Galilee: There shall ye see him as he said unto you."

### St. Luke 24: 1-9

### St. John 20: 11-18

And they say unto her, "Woman, why weepest thou?" She saith unto them, "Because they have taken away my Lord, and I know not where they have laid him."

Jesus saith unto her, "Woman, why weepest thou? Whom seekest thou?" She, supposing him to be the gardener, saith unto him, "Sir, if thou have borne him hence, tell me where thou hast laid him, and I will take him away."

Jesus saith unto her, "Mary." She turned herself and saith unto him, "Rabboni;" which is to say, Master.

Jesus saith unto her, "Touch me not; for I am not yet ascended to my Father: but go to my brethren, and say unto them, I ascend unto my Father and your Father; and to my God, and your God."

Mary Magdalene came and told the disciples that she had seen the Lord, and that he had spoken these things unto her.

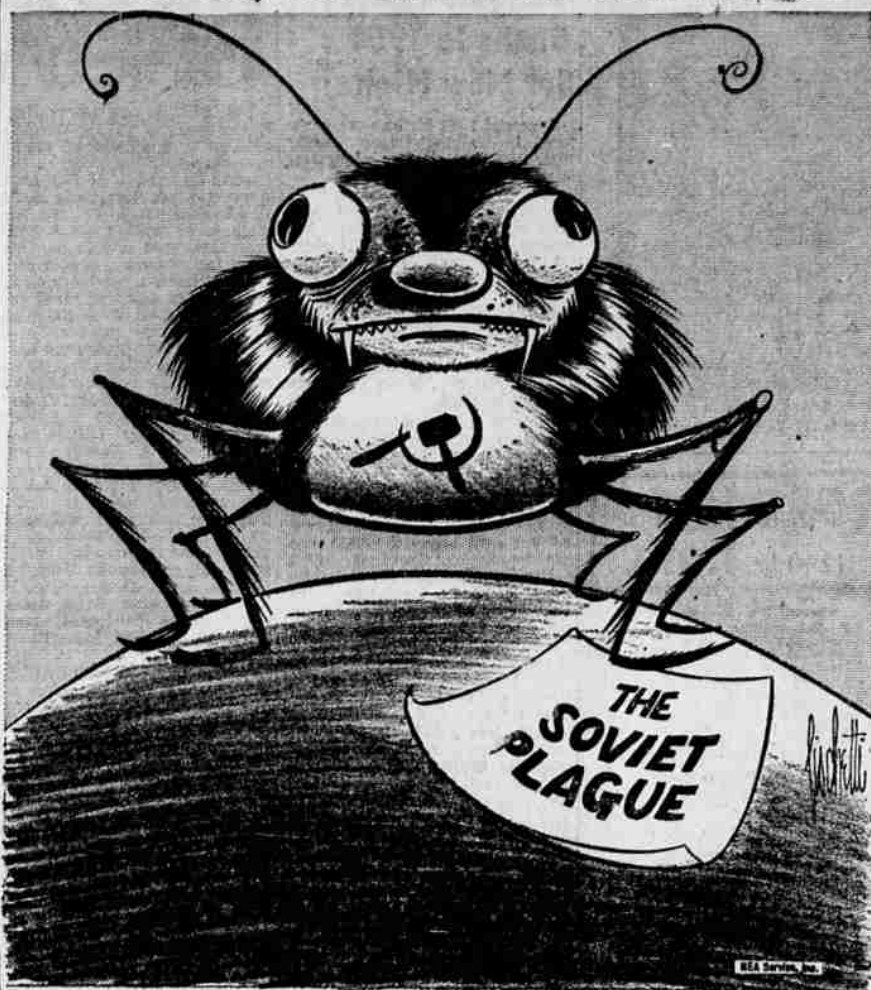

ment aises a highly important question—perhaps the most important question facing mankind:

How are we to STOP the danger of war and its attendant sense of strain throughout the world?

Personally I see no IMMEDIATE hope of ending the war and bringing to the world the incalculable benefits of universal peace, but I think we could get farther in that direction by adopting the principle of the Golden Rule and adhering to it in all our public and private transactions than any other way.

Oddly enough, it would pay IN BUSINESS. It would pay off IN DOLLARS AND CENTS.

There's a cynical notion abroad that if you want to get ahead in the world, you must be grasping and unscrupulous; you must look out unceasingly for NUMBER ONE; in every transaction you must seek to get the best of the other fellow.

I doubt that. A LOT of sound, able, ambitious business men are coming around to the belief that a contract that is fair to both sides is more profitable in the long run than a contract that gives you the long end of everything.

If a contract is fair to all parties, everybody goes ahead and does business unhesitatingly. That SPEEDS UP all the transactions involved, and thus adds to volume and cuts down cost. In modern business, volume is all-important. Once you get past the break-even point, the going is easy.

In modern business, your biggest asset is the confidence of those with whom you deal. If you LACK that, you're badly handicapped. I'm sure all SOUND business men will agree with that statement.

I think that in allocating to educational purposes approximately half of all the large appropriations it has annually available the Ford Foundation is on sound ground. We must have education if we are to make intelligent progress toward a better world.

But education, standing alone, is not the answer to everything we must seek if we are to have a better world. The dictionary defines "education," among other things, as "DISCIPLINE OF MIND" through study or instruction. COMMUNISM provides discipline of mind through study or instruction—and communism, as we are seeing it in practice throughout the world, is a foul thing.

It isn't enough just to KNOW THINGS. One of the good smart cracks of all time is that "one of the troubles with us is that so many people know so many things that ain't so."

time? Words of a loved hymn, words of the poet Whitman, come to thought, a prayer to the "dear Lord and Father of us all."

Drop Thy still dews of quietness

Till all our strivings cease;

Take from us now the strain and stress

And let our ordered lives confess

The beauty of Thy peace . . .

Just as the bulb reaches up for the light, so are we, all of us, because we cannot help it, reaching up for that light which dispels the darkness of materialism, reaching out as a people, lifting our hearts to that same God who heard our prayers when we were but a newborn nation, the same God who will help us now. Everywhere there is evidence that we as a people are turning toward Him. Like the renaissance of spring, there is a renaissance of spiritual thinking, and at this Eastertide we are grateful for Life, the Life that is God, the "Life that maketh all things new."

If knowledge is to lead mankind out of its troubles, it must have back of it the tremendous force of sound moral principles and the sound moral character that comes with knowledge and acceptance of moral principles.

The Golden Rule is best known to us as a rule or way of life set forth by Jesus in the Sermon on the Mount. As stated by Matthew in the sonorous language of the King James version of the New Testament, it reads: "Therefore all things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them; for this is the law and the prophets."

This rule, however, is older than Jesus. An old saying of the B.C. world was: "Do not do to others what you do not want done to you." Jesus turned this saying around to make it a POSITIVE rule for Christian living. In one form or another, it appears in the teachings of Mohammed and Buddha.

The point is that from the earliest beginnings mankind has recognized that doing to others as you would want others to do to you is a sound rule of human conduct. The pity of it is that mankind has never ACTED IN CONCERT on it. I fear that until mankind does act in reasonable concert on this sound moral principle the "danger of war and the attendant sense of strain throughout the world" will remain the prime threat to human welfare.

## British Labor Party Scores Heavy Comeback

LONDON — Prime Minister Churchill's Conservative Party suffered severe setbacks Friday in local elections that saw the Laborites pile up surprisingly lopsided victories.

The Socialists—ousted from national control last October—which governs the vast city—the Labor Party gained 20 seats—19 from Conservatives and one from a Liberal—among the first 84 results.

Conservative leaders said the vote was an inevitable reaction. "Our opponents have exploited the difficulties of the nation for which they themselves are largely responsible," said Henry Brooke, leader of the London Council Conservatives.

Former Foreign Minister Herbert Morrison, who directed the Labor Party's campaign, was delighted.

"Undoubtedly the national political situation has contributed," he said. "The Conservatives at the general election made a lot of false promises and implications—red meat, more food and lower prices."

Labor won 11 seats in Buckinghamshire and gained 10 others in Middlesex. Both counties lie near London. In Cumberland, far to the north, Labor gained four, and in Northamptonshire, center of the shoe making industry, Labor gained 14 seats.

Communists also suffered in Thursday's voting. The Red stronghold in London's South Hackney district polled only 3,910 Communist votes, compared with 10,212 in 1949.

## Douglas Jobless Rate Southern Oregon Low

Douglas County had the lowest rate of unemployment in Southern Oregon during the first week of April, according to the State Unemployment Compensation Commission.

In its April statistical bulletin, the Commission reports Douglas County to have an insured unemployment rating of 4.2 per cent, as compared with a state average of 6 per cent.

In Lane County the rate was 5.3, Coos 5.7, Josephine 15.9, Jackson 10.8, Klamath 10 per cent. Willamette valley counties ranged from 7.1 in Clackamas to 12.7 in Washington.

Spring recovery has been slower this year than in 1951, the Commission reports, with principal gains in clerical and service lines. Weather prevented early recovery in the logging industry. Employment gained 6,900 employees during March as compared with February.
