### Japan Clears Name Of Executed General

**TOKYO, Japan**—The Japanese Government Tuesday cleared the name of Lt. Gen. Masaharu Homma, who was hanged by the Allies for atrocities in the Philippines.

Homma, wartime Japanese commander in chief at Manila, was included in the latest list of 374 former militarists and war criminals restored to full civil status by the government.

Had he lived, Homma would now be eligible for public office. The action by independence-conscious Japan does not necessarily mean a challenge of the Allied court that condemned Homma.

The government said it considers Homma innocent of crimes against the Filipino people because he "took orders from above as a serviceman."

### Wanger-Lang Triangle Case Left To Judge

**SANTA MONICA, Calif.**—Walter Wanger submitted his fate to the court Tuesday, sidestepping a possibly sensational trial out of concern for the children involved in his shooting of his wife's agent.

"Also because of the love that he had for his wife," Wanger's attorney, Jerry Giesler, told reporters. Giesler submitted the transcript of testimony before the county grand jury which indicted Wanger for shooting Jennings Lang, 39.

The judge will decide the case without further testimony. The silver-haired producer wounded Lang, agent for Wanger's movie star wife, Joan Bennett, in the groin last Dec. 13.

### Youth Shoots At Plane, Passenger Wounded

**ALBANY, Ore.**—An airplane passenger was wounded in the neck Monday afternoon and an 18-year-old Albany youth, accused of shooting at the plane from the ground, was charged with assault with a deadly weapon.

The youth, Ronald Clark Jackson, admitted firing a .22 caliber rifle at the plane on which District Attorney Courtney Johns said.

The bullet struck Dale Bull, about 25, of Salem. He was a passenger in a timber scaler plane piloted by Leonard Cain, also of Salem.

The bullet broke a window and entered Bull's neck at the base of the skull. It was a superficial wound and Bull will be hospitalized for only a few days, a doctor said.
