Stalling Idles Truce Officers

MUNSAN, Korea (AP) — United Nations and Communist truce negotiators went through the merest flicker of the motions Saturday, each waiting for the other to suggest a compromise.

"They've got to give," said Maj. Gen. William C. Harrison, United Nations sub-delegate.

Communists showed no signs of yielding. At each of the seven brief sessions this week they suggested a recess unless the U.N. Command had something to propose.

Saturday's meeting took only one minute, the shortest this week. Total time for the seven sessions is 33 minutes. They would have taken less time if the generals didn't have to wait for translations.

Harrison told newsmen the U.N. negotiators' waiting attitude is "not frivolous. It's very serious business."

The problems neither side is making a move to solve are (1) Red insistence that Soviet Russia help police a Korean truce and (2) U.N. Command insistence that Communists cannot rebuild military airfields in North Korea.

A third key issue involving the exchange of prisoners of war is in the hands of staff officers. They are in recess.
