Driver License Exams To Pause One Week

A temporary change of schedule for drivers' license examinations in this area has been announced by Secretary of State Newbry. Examinations originally scheduled for Thursday, Friday and Saturday, May 1, 2, and 3, will not be available on these dates, Newbry stated.

All Oregon drivers' license examiners will attend an examiners' conference in Salem May 1, 2, and 3, to study examiners' problems and new developments in procedures. This is the first conference to be held since 1949. Only the May 1, 2, and 3, dates will be affected, Newbry indicated, and the published schedule of drivers' examinations will continue after those dates.
