

Chuck Verrell Paces Indian Nine To 8-3 Victory Over Bulldog Team

Slender Chuck Verrell, making his first full-game appearance for Roseburg High School's baseball squad, pitched and batted his game right into the bag Tuesday afternoon on the local diamond.

The game was transferred from Sutherlin to Roseburg because of the soggy condition of the Bulldog diamond, and it gave rooters a chance to see the young right hander at his best. With him setting the pace, the Indians avenged their earlier landslide loss by a score of 8-3.

From the mound, Verrell got better as the game progressed. He gave up four hits, but struck out 12, walked only one and hit one batter. Ten of his 12 strikeouts came in the last four innings. He finished off the game with a flourish to stifle a rally which started with two consecutive singles. The next three men went down swinging.

Shines At Bat
At bat, the youngster was easily as good. He collected two hits in three trips and accounted for four runs batted in. In the second inning, he tripled with the bases loaded and then scored on a wild pitch.

Then, in the sixth, he singled to bring in another tally.

That four-run outburst in the second inning came suddenly after two outs. Ralph Rudzik singled, Dick Stevenson walked and Louis Ripberger reached base on an error to load the sacks when Verrell stepped up. To further rattle Bob Galla, the big sophomore from Sutherlin, Gordon Willey led off the third with another looping triple and Steve Danchook singled him in.

The Bulldogs whittled two runs off that lead in the bottom of the third when Lee Leisinger and Galla got on bases on an error and hit batter. Kenny Wahl poled a timely single to bring them both in.

With Verrell's single climaxing the sixth inning action, the Indians flared up with three more runs to complete their scoring. Nub Bearer tried to fire his teammates to a rally by ripping a homer far out into the right center pasture, but that ended Bulldog scoring action. Line scores:

Vancouver Caplanos Will Be Favored To Take Western International Honors

PENTICTON, B. C. (U.P.)—The Vancouver Caplanos will likely go to the Western International League baseball post April 22 an odds-on choice to take it all.

From the Caps' spring training camp here to Palm Springs, Calif., the word has been getting around that this is the strongest Vancouver entry ever.

Two problems must be solved, however, before League President Bob Abel hands over this '32 championship. Pitching is one — and the question mark back of the Caplanos tossing staff is much the same as in every training camp over the circuit. The second is Manager Bill Schuster's knee.

Acts Up Again

Bill missed more than half the schedule last year after a collision at home plate. During the winter he had the cartilage removed from knee and it was pronounced sound. In the first week of training the knee kicked up again. Bill is getting around all right as we write this, but it isn't to say it won't keep popping out on him.

Schuster plans to play more than 100 games at third base for Vancouver and his presence will be necessary if the Caps are to dangle a 1932 pennant from their center field masthead.

Other than Schuster and the pitching, there seems little doubt that the Caps are just what everybody says—powerful. They have strength down the middle, they have long ball punch and defensive capability.

To begin with, there will be at least four Negroes on the club, and all are supposedly just as capable

as Johnny Ritchey, the Vancouver catcher who won the 1931 batting title with a .346 average.

Hitter Added
Johnny will be joined by Jesse Williams, an infielder who clubbed 342 for the Kansas City Monarchs last year. Then there's Ed Locke, a right-handed pitcher who can also play outfield, and Henry Butts, a lefty who compiled a 20-4 record while pitching for three teams in 1931.

Jim Wert, a .325 hitter with the champion Spokane Indians last season, will be on first base and Williams is likely to wind up around the keystone. Ray Tran is a holdover at shortstop with Schuster filling out the inner line of defense at the far turn.

It's hard to put a finger on the starting outfield. Ed Vanni, who hit .320 for Spokane a year ago, is a sure bet in left. Joe Scalise, a .331 hitter with Flint of the Eastern League, is favored for one spot.

Scraps For Position

Bill Cleveland, a rookie from Seattle, and Bob Duratto, a lad Schuster

picked up during the winter, are scrapping for the other. A better bet for the position, however, is Gordon Brunswick, still with Seattle but likely to come back to Vancouver. He hit .301 in '31.

The pitching? On paper it looks pretty good. Gone are Bob Snyder and Pete Hernandez, the club's two big winners last season. To help fill the gap, the Caps traded Church Abernathy to Victoria for Jim Hedgecock, a 14-11 flinger last year.

Jerry Barta has looked strong in training. He's a 1931 purchase from Tacoma. A fifth Negro, Paul Jones, is trying for a starting job on the hill and a flock of ambitious rookies are job hunting.

Myrtle Creek's powerful Vikings posted the upset of the early season on their home field by squeezing out a 5-4 victory over Grants Pass in an extra inning Tuesday afternoon.

Jim Phillips kept the Cavemen muffled with five scattered hits while the Myrtle Creek trio of Dick Komp, Bob Wilder and Don Gillespie were pounding out a tattoo.

Opponents Named

Certainly the Indians may not hope to garner the championship trophy on the strength of first-place wins. They will be pitted against such stars as all-around athlete Jim Boule of Rogue River, his teammate Ray Hiner and Myrtle Creek's Bill Perkins in the sprints, Pete Brown of Illinois Valley in the hurdles and a wide open field in the field events. However, Coach Frank Purdy hopes to make up for the individual shortages by manpower. Six places will be awarded in every event.

More complete information on trophies for the Roseburg Junior Chamber of Commerce-sponsored event reveals that the two team trophies will become permanent. Individual cups will rotate from year to year.

The championship cup, donated by Coon Creek Timber Company, and the runner-up cup, donated by Lawson's Jewelry Store, will go to the team winners for good.

Veterans Shine In Majors

Cleveland Nips White Sox, 3-2; Cardinals Win

Who said youth must be served? Apparently that doesn't go in baseball. At least it didn't in Tuesday's Major League inaugurals.

Two dozen rookies, the most in more than 20 years, saw action as the 1932 season got under way. And while the majority of them did little more than fight off their nervousness, up stepped the grizzled veterans to steal the show.

Here's how the oldsters practically blanked the youngsters:

Boston — A chilled gathering of 4,694 watched 34-year-old Preacher Roe still the Braves' bats with seven hits as Brooklyn edged out a 3-2 victory.

Chicago — Early Wynn, Cleveland's 32-year-old righthander saddened 25,037 Windy City spectators, outpitching Lefty Billy Pierce to give the Indians a 3-2 triumph over the White Sox.

St. Louis — Red Schoendienst, one of the Cardinals' "old guard" hammered a first inning homer to get the Redbirds' off to a lead they never relinquished. Pittsburgh came within one run of wiping out St. Louis' early 3-0 lead behind righthander Gerry Staley but 37-year-old relief pitcher Alpha Brazil stopped the Pirates cold, retiring the last four batters to give the Cards a 3-2 victory.

Garner Hurls Winner

Detroit — St. Louis unveiled five freshmen in its opener against the Tigers but it was the pitching of veteran Ned Garver and the hitting of 34-year-old Marty Marion that was responsible in the 3-0 victory over the Bengals. Garver allowed only six singles.

Washington — Walt Drope doubled in two runs and Ted Williams' triple accounted for the other as the Boston Red Sox shut out the Senators, 3-0.

Cincinnati — Four rookies appeared in the lineups — two each for Chicago and Cincinnati — but it was a third inning grand slam homer by 33-year-old Hank Sauer and a run-scoring pinch hit single by 31-year-old Gene Hermanski that enabled the Cubs to beat the Reds, 6-5, in 10 innings.

Blustery, cold and wet weather ruined the opening day attempts of the New York Giants and Philadelphia Athletics. Weather permitting, the Giants will inaugurate their season Wednesday against the Philadelphia Phillies while the Athletics will stick to daylight with the New York Yankees as their opponents.

Reports Still Sketchy About Salmon Fishing

Reports are still sketchy about the first day of salmon fishing in the area, but at the latest report the biggest fish hooked in the initial onslaught was a 28 pounder.

According to Biologist Bill Pitney of the State Game Commission, approximately 50 fishermen took a whirl at outgutting the fish. This includes stretches of river between the Forks and Tye. Apparently the best fishing was found at Winchester below the dam where about 10 were caught averaging between 12 and 15 pounds.

Both the South Umpqua and side streams such as Calapooia Creek were muddy enough to hamper good fishing. Very few fish had gone over the dam by the opening day, so Pitney guessed little successful fishing was being done up river.
