"Fixer" Tells Senators Of Big Money On Deals

WASHINGTON (AP) — Frank Nathan, a self-styled deal-hunter, told investigating senators Monday he pocketed \$37,000 for a tip that an aluminum plant was for sale in California.

"I didn't dream it was going to make that kind of money," he said. "The prices must have gone up."

Nathan was in the witness chair as the Senate Investigations subcommittee continued its search for wrongdoing in the government's sale of surplus property under the old War Assets Administration.

One witness said Nathan impressed him as being "a sort of fixer." And Nathan himself said he is "always trying to get some deals."

It had been brought out that Nathan and a New York junk dealer named Joseph Labowitz made \$57,000 each in the sale of a surplus aluminum plant in California to a syndicate in Torrance, Calif.

Nathan told the subcommittee he spent a lot of time "fooling around" the old War Assets Administration looking for "deals."

His luck hasn't been too good lately, he said. Since 1949, he said, "I've been trying to get some deals, but I didn't get any."

Nathan's name figured prominently last year in a House investigation of scandals in the income tax department.

Abraham Teitelbaum, a Chicago lawyer who once worked for gangster Al Capone, told a House committee Nathan and another man offered to help fix his "tax troubles" for half a million dollars.

Irwin Geiger, attorney for the Landauit Syndicate of Torrance, purchasers of the aluminum plant, told the committee Nathan and Labowitz "shoveled themselves in on the deal," claiming influence he said they did not have.

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State Cattle Raising Proposed By Pearson

SALEM (AP) — State Treasurer Walter J. Pearson proposed Tuesday that the state go into the cattle business by leasing State Land Board lands in the Warner Valley of Lake County.

The cattle would be used to provide meat for state institutions.

Pearson said several thousand acres of good grazing land in the valley are up for lease next month. Gov. Douglas McKay said he is wary of putting the state in the cattle business. Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry said he is inclined to favor the proposal, but wants to study it thoroughly.

The Board of Control, which runs state institutions, would lease the land from the land board.

However, the membership of each board is the same—McKay, Newberry and Pearson.
