NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the undersigned will up to 8 o'clock P.M. on the 24th day of April, 1952, receive sealed bids for the purchase of negotiable serial coupon bonds of School District No. 8 of Douglas County, Oregon, in the sum of \$12,000.00, said bonds to be in denominations of \$1,000.00 each and dated July 1, 1952 and maturing as follows:

The first 2 bonds in number on January 1, 1954, and 2 succeeding bonds of each and every year thereafter up to and including the 1st day of January, 1959. Said bonds shall draw interest at the rate to be specified by the successful bidder, but no more than legal interest, payable semi-annually on January 1st and July 1st of each year. Principal and interest shall be payable at the office of the Treasurer of Douglas County, Oregon.

All bids must be accompanied by a certified check, bank draft or cashier's check payable to School District No. 8 of Douglas County, Oregon, in an amount equal to 5% of the bid, to be retained by the school district in case the successful bidder shall fail to complete the purchase of said bonds in accordance with the terms of his bid.

Said bids will be opened at a public meeting of the Board of Directors of said district to be held in the Canyonville High School Building in said district on the 24th day of April, 1952, at 8 o'clock P.M., or any legal adjournment of said meeting, and the bonds shall be sold by the board to the highest and best bidder, but for not less than par and accrued interest.

School Construction Begins
Hardie and Hepner, Eugene contractors, were awarded the contract to build the new Yoncalla Grade School. The construction for the first unit of the new school, costing \$88,996, will start immediately. Contracts were opened Friday evening. The first unit of the eventual 16-classroom school will contain four classrooms, toilets, janitor's room, covered porch for bus loading, and play area and a separate boiler house.

Construction will be wood frame, with concrete slab floors, and plywood walls. Architects Wilmsen and Endicott of Eugene designed the structure.

Other bidders were H. L. Shields and son, Eugene, \$71,426; Todd Building Co., Roseburg, \$71,800; Industrial Building Co., Eugene, \$72,884; Youel and Huffman, Eugene, \$74,000; A. T. Fox, North Bend, \$75,048; and H. Barnhart, Medford, \$80,711.44. Cost of construction has been estimated at \$70,000.
