

**'Fair Play' For Officials Sought By College Heads**

HOT SPRINGS, Va. (AP) — The National Association of Collegiate Commissioners wants to abolish "unfair treatment" of officials at athletic contests and is going to back the National Collegiate Athletic Association to the limit in eliminating rules infractions.

The commissioners of the nation's 10 major athletic conferences closed out their four-day annual meeting here Sunday by passing a resolution urging spectators and coaches to maintain an "attitude of fair play" toward the officials, particularly in football and basketball games.

Late Saturday, the commissioners pledged their "whole-hearted support" of the NCAA regulations governing intercollegiate sports.

Idaho, meanwhile, evened a two-game series with Washington by downing the Huskies 9-3 at Seattle. Washington won the opening game Friday 14-8.

The Seattle series left Washington, Oregon State and Idaho tied for second place, with a win and a loss each.

**Myrtle Creek Beats Vikings**

The Myrtle Creek Vikings began to loom as the strongest prep baseball nine in the county Saturday as they snared their seventh consecutive win of the season with a loss.

The Viks won their second JOJ league encounter at home by out-slugging Eagle Point, 7-5. The powerful Myrtle Creek squad capitalized on two big three-run innings to wrap up the game.

Eagle Point went to work immediately on Pitcher Leroy McCauley and put him on the ropes with a three-run surge in the first inning. Then, the Pointers managed another single tally in the third before the Viking batters got moving.

In the bottom of that third came to Myrtle Creek fashioned a three-run rally of its own. The Viks tied it up in the fourth with a single run, but Eagle Point moved back in the lead in the top of the fifth, 5-4. McCauley's game went in the bag, however, in the sixth when the Vikings exploded with three more runs.

McCauley pitched a brilliant game, giving up only three hits and striking out 13 Eagles.

**Yoncalla Upsets Elkton, 4 To 3**

Yoncalla's stunning 4-3 upset win over Elkton Friday was the most fiery battle in the still-early "B" baseball season.

After the game, the air was blue with threats of protest and counter-protest. Elkton Coach Carl Grimrud threatened to protest an infield fly rule which caused a difference of opinion between umpires in the seventh. And Coach Dick Strait threatened a counter-protest to a first-inning call at first base over which the umpires were again at loggerheads.

The Elks moved to a 2-0 lead by the third inning on single tallies in each the first and third. Four Yoncalla singles, however, tied up the score at 2-2 in the bottom of the third. Jerry Boan and Bill Fast each singled to bring in runs. Errors and an overthrow at third put Yoncalla ahead, 3-2, in the fourth, but Elkton came back to deadlock the score again in the sixth. Dave Scott was hotboxed between third and home, but managed to score.

The Eagles collected their winning run in the seventh on a mental error by the Elkton shortstop. With the bases loaded on three singles, Alvis Alsup drove a grounder to the Elkton short, who failed to throw Jerry Boan out at home.

Alsup was credited with the win. He struck out 12 and gave up only four hits to the powerful Elk stickers.
