

Highway Change Asked By Reedsport Council

REEDSPORT — The Reedsport City Council wants the State Highway Commission to reroute a new highway which is scheduled to pass across one section of the city's water supply.

The commission is rebuilding the Coast Highway. One section of the new route is to extend several hundred feet across an irregular point of Clear Lake — source of water for Reedsport and Winchester Bay.

The route already is constructed to the edge of the lake, however.

THE "PUBLIC" atomic bomb blast at Frenchman's Flat, near Las Vegas, Nev., is to be well covered, comes news from Mutual-Don Lee's special events dept. Mai. George Fielding Elliot will head the special broadcasting crew and will provide on-the-scene reports of this latest major development in American arms. The exact date, and times, of the experimental explosion have not as yet been made public by the atomic energy commission. It is merely listed as "after Sunday, Apr. 28," and will be carried locally, probably too late to inform you via this column, but it will be air-plugged. Several broadcasts are planned. One will be the actual description of the air-drop of the new atomic weapon and of the "mushroom" effect of the explosion. Other special reports will provide releasable information on troop activities, civilian and military reactions, etc.
