Future Contracts For Sale Of Timber By BLM Will Embrace Fire Safeguards

The Bureau of Land Management is preparing to write fire prevention safeguards into sales contracts on public domain timber in the Pacific Northwest.

Roscoe Bell, regional administrator, reports that 17 fire prevention requirements have been listed. Stipulations will be written into each contract, he says. Only the precautions necessary to each sale will be included.

Buchenwald Witch Loses Appeal From Life Term

KARLSRUHE, Germany. — Ilse Koch, known as the "witch" of Buchenwald, still must serve out a life term for Nazi concentration camp atrocities.

The West German Supreme Court Tuesday night threw out her conviction she had been convicted twice of the same crime. Hans Richter, president of the court, said the convictions were for different offenses.

U.S. Battle Casualties In Korea Near 108,000

WASHINGTON. — Announced U.S. battle casualties in Korea reached 107,666 Wednesday, an increase of 295 since last week.

The Defense Department's weekly summary based on notifications to families through last Friday reported these new totals:

Killed in action 16,898; wounded 78,236; missing 12,532.

Casualties by services: Army 87,898; Navy 1,276; Air Force 1,121; Marine Corps 17,371.

FILMS BAN ASKED

From Washington:

"The government collected more taxes last year than ever before—about \$362 for each man, woman and child in the nation. . . . The internal revenue bureau announced today that 1951 collections totaled \$56,093,339,426.69 (a shade over \$6 BILLION dollars), an increase of 40 per cent over 1950."

That brings up an interesting question: How big is a billion?

Divers Seek Body Of Drowned Boy

Ex-Navy divers, using County diving equipment, began probing Cow Creek today for the body of Darren Franklin Cox, who drowned April 8.

The 18-year-old West Fork youth was last seen when the raft upon which he was riding was swept into rough water and overturned. A companion riding with him swam to safety.

Barb wire was stretched across the creek in five places shortly after he was lost, but only a white T-shirt he was wearing has been found.

Deputy Sheriff Ira Byrd said residents of the area, under direction of Deputy W. I. Worrall, conducted an all-day search Sunday.

He said the body is apparently lodged under rocks because it should have come to the surface by now. Deep holes were dynamited in the hope of dislodging it. Search is hindered by a placer mining operation up the creek that would be difficult to spot the body anyhow, Byrd added.

Passengers Pay Fine Imposed On Bus Driver

GOODING, Idaho. — Greyhound bus driver Ray Hemmert of Boise was arrested for speeding through a school zone Tuesday and fined \$15 by Police Judge Stanley.

His passengers took up a collection to pay the fine and Hemmert came out a nickel ahead on the deal.

Gen. Eisenhower Given GOP Vote In N. Y., Pennsylvania

Senator Taft Poor Second In Both Races

Pennsylvania Demos Back Kefauver, N.Y. Vote Favors Harriman

Eisenhower-for-President leaders staked a claim Wednesday to the lion's share of Republican presidential-nominating votes in New York and Pennsylvania, where the general scored lopsided election victories Tuesday.

In the Pennsylvania popularity poll, Gen. Eisenhower drew 825,922 votes in 8,127 of 8,421 precincts.

This compared with 168,451 write-ins for Sen. Taft of Ohio and 117,596 ballot votes for former Gov. Stassen of Minnesota.

In the race for 60 Pennsylvania district delegates, Taft and Eisenhower slates collided over eight posts from the Pittsburgh area. Eisenhower forces led 6 to 2.

Taft's name was not on the ballot—he kept it off and urged his supporters not to write it in—and his backers called the results "meaningless."

Ike Gets Demo Support

But Eisenhower leaders hoped this showing, plus 17,712 votes the general drew among Democrats, might bring the state's 70 votes his way at the GOP nominating convention in July.

In New York, friends of Eisenhower won seven of 11 primary tests, indicating he will receive at least 85 of the state's 96 convention votes.

Taft backers won three and one was undecided. The results seemed to strengthen the hand of Gov. Dewey, who wants Eisenhower as Republican presidential nominee.

There was no popularity race in

Model Officer, Brother Face Burglary Charges

NEW YORK. — It was tough for Detective Nathan Mennen, fellow officers thought, when his younger brother was arrested last fall in a \$29,000 Brooklyn Post Office burglary.

It was even tougher Wednesday. The 40-year-old Mennen himself was arrested, suspended from the police force and accused of being the leader of a five-man gang that staged the post office job.

Brother Irving Mennen, 37, allegedly was one of the gang.

Nathan had been assigned to investigate the case. When his brother was arrested, he was removed from it. Later, he was promoted to patrolman for his poor work.

But for 13 years he had been considered a model officer.

R. F. Kennen Elected Louisiana Governor

NEW ORLEANS. — Robert F. Kennen of Minden is Louisiana's new governor—to no one's surprise.

The Democratic nominee swamped his Republican opponent, Harrison Bagwell, the first GOP candidate in years, in Tuesday's general election. C. E. Barham, state senator from Ruston and the Democratic choice for lieutenant-governor, also was elected without trouble.

He was alerted up to the last, reading papers and watching television daily.

Educators Finish Oakland Hi School Evaluation Study

Oakland High School became the third school in the state to complete an evaluation study of its school and teaching staff. County and state educators Tuesday concluded a two-day evaluation study which was the final phase of a four-month study by the Oakland teachers and school administrators.

The visiting committee making the concluding study included Dick Sorick, supervisor of secondary education, State Department, Salem, coordinator of the study; Virgil Kingsley, superintendent of Cottage Grove schools; Pat Brown, principal of Drain High School; Kenneth Barneburg, Douglas County superintendent of schools; Paul Elliott, Roseburg superintendent of schools; Ray Karp, Myrtle Creek high school principal; Dr. Hearn, department of education, University of Oregon, Eugene; and Milton Huff, assistant county school superintendent of Lincoln County.

The committee spent two days visiting classes, observing activities and inspecting the plant.

The evaluation study was conducted entirely as an efficiency measure to increase the effectiveness of the school, said Millard L. Gilbreath, Oakland superintendent-principal. All subject field areas are evaluated as well as pupil activity program, library service, school plant, staff and administration.

The evaluative criteria used was the 1950 edition of the Cooperative Study of Secondary School Standards, put out by the American Council on Education, Washington, D. C. This material is used nationwide in evaluating schools, said Gilbreath.

Oakland High School was the third school to conduct such a study in the state this year. McMinnville and Newberg High Schools are the others. There have been only five such studies in the state since the criteria was reorganized in 1950.

Gilbreath and Jim Embree, assistant principal of the Oakland schools, jointly coordinated the self-evaluation.

The visiting committee ended its study by giving oral reports to the local high school staff, administration and school board at 3:30 p.m. Tuesday.

One Of Six Civil War Survivors Dies At 107

WEST LOS ANGELES, Calif. — Douglas T. Story, who ran away to enlist twice before his father finally let him join the Union army and get into the Civil War, is dead at the age of 107.

He was one of the six known survivors of the Grand Army of the Republic.

Story, who said he joined Company 1 of the 136th Illinois Infantry at the age of 16 "to defend St. Louis from Old Gen. Joe Shelby," died Tuesday of pneumonia at the Sawtelle Veterans Administration hospital.

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Morse Flays Big Business In Hot Speech

'Feudal System' Plan Of Steel, Other Firms, Oregon Solon Charges

WASHINGTON. — Sen. Morse (R-Ore.) accused the steel industry and other big business Wednesday of trying to saddle America with a "feudal system," while the administration took two more steps toward decreeing a pay increase in the government - seized steel mills.

Morse and CIO President Philip Murray both denounced the steel companies at a Senate Labor Committee hearing. Morse saying that big business is cheating the American people "in the name of private enterprise."

The other developments:

1. The White House formally confirmed reports that the National Advisory Board on Mobilization Policy, made up of representatives of industry, labor, agriculture and the public, had decided to raise recommendations from the Wage Stabilization Board, which the steel companies refused to accept, were within the established WSB pattern.

2. Secretary of Commerce Sawyer the government boss of the steel mills, announced that as soon as he gets definite wage and price recommendations from the Wage Stabilizer Roger L. Putnam, he will carry them "promptly" to Truman for approval.

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
