Grants Pass Team Strong For Cinder Meet Friday

"The strongest and best balanced team to represent Grants Pass in years"

That's the description given to the track squad to meet Roseburg Thursday night. As proof of the pudding, Grants Pass has defeated Medford in a dual affair. The strong Black Tornado won both the Rogue Relays and the Hayward Relays and is considered the top squad in the state.

It will undoubtedly be the toughest meet of the year for the Indians, and what is more, Roseburg's two perennial winners Ralph Rudzik and Bob Brandt meet their first real competition.

Brandt has never been pushed in the 440-yard dash and has been almost invincible in the 880. How-

ever, Grants Pass will field Rex DeFur in both these events. DeFur posted a 52.4 second showing in the 440 and a 2:05 in the 880 in the Medford dual meet. Both these marks are better than Brandt's lowest. This should be the running duel of the night.

Hasn't Lost Meet

Rudzik is another man who hasn't lost a meet this year. He has a capacity of just beating the longest distance of a competition in the javelin throw. This time he draws a real test. Brian Carothers hurled the spear 161 feet against Medford to top by a foot Rudzik's best this year.

Other events appear pretty gloomy on the Roseburg side. In the dashes, Grants Pass Coach Russ Werner has Dave Talbot whose best time in the 100 is 10.2.

No Roseburg runner is under 11 seconds. Werner has three broad jumpers hovering around 20 feet. Alton Stone jumped 19 feet 5 inches at the Hayward Relays, good enough to beat any Roseburg jump this year, but he was bested by teammates Dick Williams and Gary McFarland. Williams went 20-2 and McFarland did 20-7 1/2. In the pole vault, McFarland has a top mark of 11 feet 9 inches. Spencer Lewis has hurled the disc 134 feet.

Outside these events, Roseburg's only other prime hope is the mile in which Doug Ugstad has a mark of 4:52. Ed Stritzke is capable of a mile in the low 4:50s.
