

Records Expected To Fall In 'B' Track Meet Tonight

In a record-breaking county track year, the Douglas County "B" school record book looks about as safe as a house of cards for the running of the annual meet on the Finlay Field tonight at 7.

The county runners and field men will share the program with The Grants Pass - Roseburg dual meet harriers. Events from each meet will be alternated.

Only the broad jump, high jump discus and 880 appear out of danger. Oakland's fine athlete, Dale Robinson, set both the jump records in 1950 and 1951, and no one has approached his marks of 5-8 in the high jump and 19-10 in the broad jump. Glide's Jim Smith apparently will hold his 880 record of 2:16.4 set in 1951. Homer Waters of Yoncalla is safe in the discus with a throw last year of 123 feet 1 inch.

But the remainder of events will probably take a facelift. The 100-yard dash should be the race of the day to see who will set the new mark. The record is a turtle's pace 11.2 seconds, but that mark has been topped consistently this year by Gary Coats of Glendale and Bill Hoffee of Canyonville. Coats has a best time of 10.2 and Hoffee has run the course in 10.5. Last year, Hoffee beat Coats easily.

Both Coats and Hoffee will also be the top duelers for the 220-yard record. The record is 24.8. Coats has a best time of 23.5 and Hoffee has a 24.4.

Has Bann Bettered

The 440 has been bettered in dual meets twice this year, once by Drain's Alan Brown and once by Ted James of Days Creek. Brown was clocked at 57.1 and James at 55.8. Charles Falconer of Canyonville and Don Higby of Yoncalla apparently are tops in the mile. Falconer has a 5:14 mile and Higby has run it in 5:18. The record is just half a second faster than Falconer's time.

The top "B" hurdler in the county appears to be Jerry Boan of Yoncalla. Both the 19.2 high and 25.9 low hurdle records should take a beating from his scaling. His best high-stick time is 18.5 and he has a 23 flat low time.

Glide appears to be the white hope in the relay. The Wildcats have consistently bettered the record of 1:45.2. Their fastest time is 1:43.1.

Most of the field events have an even chance to stand, but are still shaky. Elwood Voelker is just a hair behind the record in the shot put with a heave of 39'11". The record of 40'3" was set last year by Yoncalla's Gerald Rust.

The discus mark hasn't been approached, but Bill Fast is expected to top his own javelin record 143 feet. He has a high throw this year of 148 feet. However, Charles Marier of Glendale may give him trouble since he has a throw of 146.

The pole vault record stands at 9-9 and that's the highest jump of the year. It was made by Drain's Berg.

The preliminaries of the county meet will get underway at 3:30 this afternoon. Final field events for both the county and Roseburg-Grants meets are set for 7 p.m. Running finals will follow at 8 for both meets.

Two Pin Honors Earned In Playoff

Two league bowling championships were determined in playoffs at the Roseburg Alleys Wednesday night.

The Eagles rolled a 2,786 series to defeat Coen Supply Co. for the Industrial League championship, and Van Dine Meat Co. of Myrtle Creek topped 2,137 pins to defeat Luverne's Dress Shop for the Women's crown.

John Sanders and Tom Hobbs paced the Eagles to their victory. Sanders rolled a 231 game, and Hobbs scored a 551 series for the winners. Coen Supply, the second-half winner in regular season play, was topped in every game and finished the evening with a 2-632 series.

Frances Bistack took both game and series honors in setting the style for Van Dine Meat Co. She bowled a brilliant 203 game and a 469 series for the night. Van Dine lost the second game in the series, but won the first and third. Series score for Luverne's was 2,083.

Siegmund walked four men before the side was retired. Shortstop Mel Brown's double scoring three Vandal runners was the inning's big blow.

Browns Upset Indians Again, Assume Lead

What goes with those revitalized, Hornsby-ized St. Louis Browns? One night they "Byrne" up the Cleveland Indians' seven-game winning streak and the next they raise "Cain" with the Tribe, shoving them out of first place and taking over the American League's top rung themselves.

Following on the heels of the splendid eight-hitter by Tommy Byrne Tuesday, Bob Cain unfurled a one-hit masterpiece Wednesday night as he pitched the rampaging Browns into first place with a brilliant 1-0 triumph over the Indians' great Bob Feller.

Cain had to pitch the best game of his life in order to win for Feller was magnificent, too, pitching a one-hitter himself. The lone Brownie safety, a triple by lead-off batter Bobby Young, proved Feller's undoing.

Marty Marion followed with a grounder to Al Rosen. When the third baseman fumbled the ball, Young scored the only run of the game.

Limit To One Hit

It was the second time in Major League history that each pitcher limited the opposition to one hit.

On July 4, 1906, Mordcan (Threng) Brown of Chicago and Lefty Leifield of Pittsburgh permitted only one hit each as the Cubs defeated the Pirates, 1-0.

On May 2, 1917, Hippo Jim Vaughn of Chicago and Fred Toney of Cincinnati pitched no-hitters each through nine innings. The Reds, however, nicked Vaughn for two hits and a run in the 10th to win 1-0 at Toney hurled a 10-inning no-hitter.

In other games, Wednesday, Boston's youth-infested Red Sox behind the five-hit pitching of 37-year-old Ellis Kinder, defeated the New York Yankees, 3-1. Kinder walked six and fanned five in besting Allie (No-hitter) Reynolds.

The New York Giants outslug the Boston Braves, 9-5 in the only National League game.

Scheduled games between the St. Louis Cardinals and Cincinnati, Brooklyn and Philadelphia, Detroit and Chicago and Washington and the Philadelphia Athletics were postponed because of rain. Pittsburgh and Chicago's Cubs were idle.

Gene Smith Just Edges Past Chavez For Victory

WASHINGTON (AP) — Gene Smith, a hot article in the featherweight ranks, still is unbeaten, but he racked up his 31st victory Wednesday night by a narrow margin.

The 26-year-old Smith, rated fifth among the world's featherweights by the National Boxing Association, went into the ring a 4 to 1 favorite over Fabella Chavez of Hollywood. Judges and the referee gave him a narrow 2-1 decision.

Sutherlin Nips Viking Thinclads

Paced by Sophomore Bob Thompson, Roseburg invitational star, the Ralph Dyson's Sutherlin scantclads won a 68-54 track victory at Myrtle Creek Wednesday afternoon.

Thompson continued to be one of the fastest sprint men in the county as he chalked off a 10.5 second 100 and a 24.3 second 220 to score 10 of his 11 points. He was overshadowed in the individual pointmaking department, however, by Delmar Andrews, Myrtle Creek's ace hurdler.

The red-thatched Viking harrier scored 12 1/2 points by winning the high hurdle events, placing third in the high jump and running the third leg on the winning relay team. His 16.2 high hurdle mark was outstanding.

Sutherlin barely nosed out Myrtle Creek in first-place ribbons, 7-6, but made up the difference in depth.

Myrtle Creek's relay squad ran its best 880 of the year with a fine 1:41.9 showing. This is also the best relay time in the county this year.

Failure of the pitching staff seems to be the root of Sweeney's trouble. He just can't find enough men who can go the distance.

But it's much too early to count the Rainiers out, for, as Sweeney says, "We're a good team and we still have more than 150 games to go."

Seattle got a slight nudge in the right direction by shading Oakland 8-7 in an 11 inning game Wednesday night. But by overtime standards, that contest was as nothing beside the one waged at Hollywood between the Stars and loop leader San Diego.

Goes 18 Innings

It went 18 innings — four hours and 18 minutes. The end came when the Padres' John Davis rapped a bases loaded double good for two runs and the ball game, 5-3.

The Portland Beavers scored five runs in the seventh in downing Los Angeles 10-5, the parade starting on a bases-loaded double by Eddie Basinski. For good measure, Outfielder Clint Conaster, wallpopped a home run in the eighth for the Beavers. Herman Besse, the fourth of five pitchers used by Los Angeles, was blamed for the setback although he worked only a third of an inning.

Seattle's win was on a bases-loaded outfield fly smacked by George Vico. The Rainiers tied it up in the ninth with a run on a walk, a double and a single.

At San Francisco walks were the undoing of Sacramento, which lost its seventh straight, 5-1.

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
