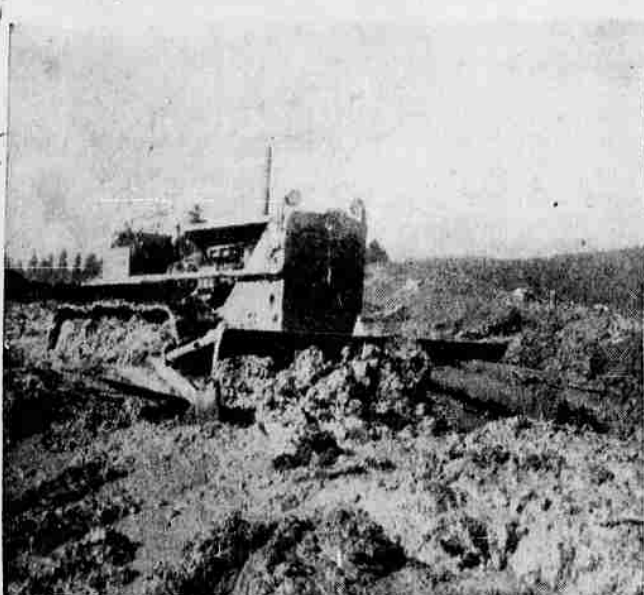


"CAT" DIESELS MAKE WAY FOR THE BIG BIRDS

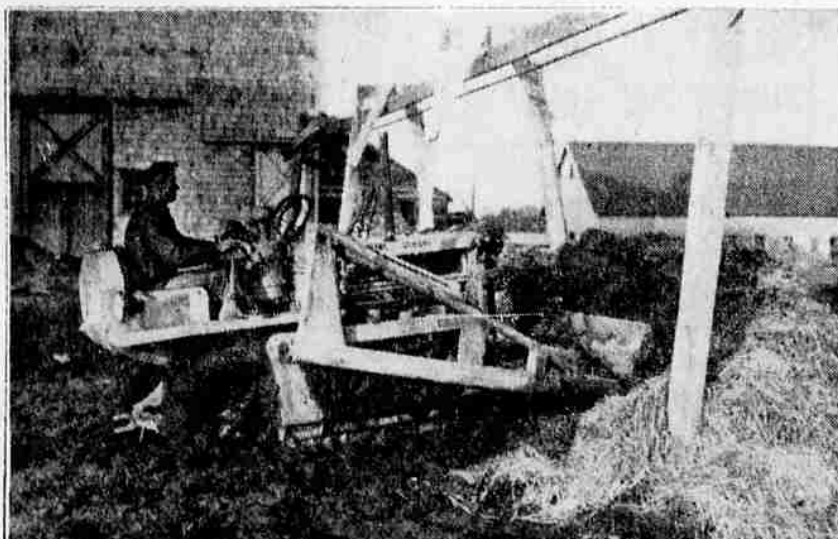

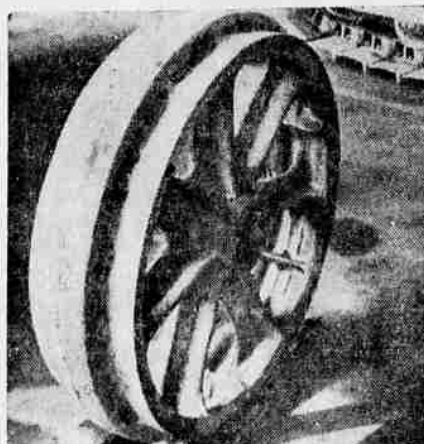

Methodist Missionary Sets Visit In Roseburg Monday

A missionary of the Methodist Church in India, who has served as district superintendent, first aid "doctor," educator and building advisor, will be guest speaker at the First Methodist Church Monday at 8 p.m.

He is the Rev. Paul E. Wagner, superintendent of Methodist work in a district in India.

At noon Monday, the Rev. Wagner will address members of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce in the Umpqua Hotel. From 6 to 7:30 p.m. a smorgasbord dinner will be served at the church by the church high school group. Proceeds will be allotted to the group's missionary fund.

M. S. Kumber, a 4-H leader who spent several years in India, will introduce the Rev. Wagner. During 1950, Mr. Wagner treated over 3,500 people at his garage dispensary in India. To take care of ailing people, he had to establish office hours, read numerous medical books, and keep in contact with doctors in Bidar. A small dispensary has since been completed with funds from Methodists in the West Virginia Conference, and a medical practitioner is on duty.

Constructs Village

One of the most outstanding accomplishments in Mr. Wagner's district is the construction of a new village school, Prakashalaya, which means, "place of light." There are seventeen buildings, including six model village houses for married students. The houses are modest, so villagers may copy them, with fireplaces and windows to provide ventilation not ordinarily found in the homes of the poor. Mr. Wagner is encouraging the people to plant gardens and grow better food. Craftsmen from nearby villages teach carpentry and masonry.

Mr. Wagner is spending part of his furlough year in studying rural extension methods in the United States. He was born in Sharpsburg, Pa., and was a pastor in Trenton, N. J., before being appointed a missionary. He was educated at Allegheny College, the University of Pittsburgh and Drew Theological Seminary.

He first went to India in 1937, and was pastor of the famed Taylor Memorial Church in Bombay for five years before his assignment to India. He later served as first Methodist missionary to be appointed to the new "group movement" area of the Udgir and Nander Districts in Hyderabad.
